Sweden's Liquor

System Explained.

The consumption of intoxicating liquors in Sweden has been reduced nearly fifty per cent. since the beginning of 1914, when Sweden's liquor rationing system went into effect. This is shown by the latest official reports which say that the reduction took place without absolutely excluding anyone from the use of alcoholic stimulants except those who abused the law by drinking to excess.

Under the Swedish rationing system individuals are given cards upon which they can obtain a given amount of distilled liquor or wines. The maximum amount allowed to any individual is about seven and one-half pints per month equal to about five bottles a month, and this is allowed to married men.

Married women receive no allowance except from their husband's cards, while unmarried women receive as low as one and one-half pints per month, just a little more than the contents of an ordinary sized bottle of whiskey. On special occasions these allowances are increased if requested.

The rationing cards are revoked in the case of individuals convicted of drunkenness. The official report says that the number of inebriates whose

licenses have been taken away have decreased enormously. In 1913 the number of inebriates who lost their licenses to buy intoxicants was 50,45 persons per thousand; while in 1921 only 16,55 persons per thousand were found guilty of drunkenness.

The consumption of distilled liquors in Sweden in 1913 amounted to 8,541,048 liters, a liter being a trifle less than two pints. In 1921 the Swedish people used 4,920,400 liters. Meantime the population has increased from 5,750,000 to 6,000,000.

**Bitter Plight of
Russian Refugees.**

THOUSANDS BEGGING ALMS AND FOOD.

Constantinople, Associated Press.—Bitter cold weather and heavy falls of snow are intensifying the sufferings of the legions of Russian refugees who have sought shelter and food within the Turkish capital and its environment. Their misery is great. They haunt the dark streets and alleys at night begging alms and bread. There are nearly 30,000 who are utterly destitute. The American Red Cross left here a short time ago. The refugees are now turning their attention to the embassies. Entertainment, balls and gala performances are being given by charitable persons in an effort to raise money for the unfortunate Russian outcasts, but the response is very feeble. The truth is life in Constantinople is so dear, that only the well-to-do can afford to give any substantial help to others. The plight of the Russian women and children and old men is pathetic to the last degree. There is a shortage of wood and other fuel and many are dying daily of exposure.

A LARGE ORDER.

In addition to the Russian, Greek and Turkish refugees, whose number runs into tens of thousands, Constantinople has to provide food and shelter for the Armenian refugees of Cilicia. Appeals are placarded about the city to move the population to absorb their destitute brethren but nobody seems to worry about them. "Let the rich Americans or the League of Nations take care of them," is the general response. Sir Samuel Hoare, Deputy High Commissioner for the League of Nations, is here in connection with the International Relief Fund for Russian refugees, with which Dr. Fridtjof Nansen is connected. His arrival has greatly heartened the Russians, especially General Wrangle and other Russian officials upon whom a great part of the task of caring for the refugees has fallen. It is hoped here the League will take energetic measures to ameliorate the grave conditions that exist.
