1. In all cases of scarlet fever and diphtheria (including diphtheritic or membranous croup), every medical practitioner who shall attend on such case shall immediately or within twelve hours after he has ascertained the facts of such disease, report the same in writing to the Public Health Officer, under a penalty for each offence of not less than ten nor more than fifty dollars.
2. Every householder, so soon as he shall become aware that any occupant of his house is suffering from scarlet fever or diphtheria, shall give notice of such disease to the Public Health Officer, under a penalty for each offence not exceeding fifty dollars.

**DEALERS INTENTION OF MAKING MILK 14 CENTS A QUART.**

Consumers in the city have been finding with justifying supply notices from the milk dealers an increase in the price of milk from 12 cents to 14 cents per quart, with a slight discount in the milk price to those who buy supply tickets, while cream jumps in price from 60 to 70 cents per quart, the new prices to become effective on Monday next. In the circular notification of the increased prices the dealers point out that this increase in price is the result of a battle between producers and dealers, the former declaring that the time was ill-opportune and the public ill-disposed to pay the higher price.

The overtures of the producers to obtain the increase culminated in a committee being appointed to meet with the milk dealers at Halifax, and this meeting took place some two weeks ago in the Board of Trade rooms. Strenuous opposition to any advance in milk and cream prices were then advanced by their ship-owners and the conference ended with their flat refusal to consider any such step.

The decision against this ruling on the part of the producers was made known a few days ago, when legal dealers were advised by their shippers that unless an increase in milk and cream prices took effect by Oct. 15th, the entire milk supply of the city would be withheld.

"We doubt the wisdom of opposing these men any longer," the dealers state in their circular, "and we have therefore agreed to pay the higher price from November 1st.

"Consideration warns us to avoid a milk strike. It means chaos, and no good can come of it for the men in the country are determined to get a living price for their milk."—Halifax Chronicle.
