

INTER COLLEGIATE FOOTBALL—

ST. BON'S DEFEAT B.F.C.

The inter collegiate football game, played at St. George's Field yesterday afternoon, between the St. Bon's and Fildians, drew a large gathering of supporters of the three colleges to the field, and after a spirited and well contested game, saw the St. Bon's eleven emerge victorious, by a narrow margin of 4 goals to 3. The conditions were ideal for football, and the only drawback was that the last fifteen minutes of the game was played in darkness.

First Half.

The teams took the field at 4 o'clock with St. Bon's defending the western goal. In the kick-off play opened up fast with dangerous escapes on the opposing goals. During play in the Fildian territory, one of the B. F. C. players drew a foul which gained for St. Bon's a free kick. The ball was nicely placed by Murphy, but only partly stopped by the goalkeeper, glancing off his hand into the corner of the net, thus drawing first blood for St. Bon's. The Fildians then put more vim into their play and saw the forwards working the ball west, where a good attempt was made to score the equalizer. Play was then of a give and take nature for the next five minutes. Much up and down play followed, a feature of which was the splendid combination play of both forward lines. The St. Bon's then staged another determined attack, and in a melee which occurred in front of B.F.C. goal, Graham availed of an opening and scored No. 2. Before the shouts of their supporters had died away, a third goal was scored through the efforts of Kelly. The Fildians then awoke to the occasion, and with Rendell playing at centre-half, a vast improvement was noticeable in that team, when play was centred for the most part around St. Bon's goal.

After several unsuccessful attempts had been made to score, a scrimmage followed in one of the plays with the result that Eales found the net for his team. The St. Bon's then staged another rally, and saw Cotter beat the Fildian goalie with a very pretty shot. The half time whistle then sounded with St. Bon's leading by 4 goals to 1.

Second Half

Upon resumption of play the Fild-

ians put forth their best efforts to

cut down their opponents lead. Suc-

cess came after ten minutes of hard

play when Wood made a pretty run

down field. A well placed shot was

sent to Farrell, but being only partly

cleared, (alder rushed in and scored

from the rebound. This goal put new

life into the game, and the spectators

were given many exciting moments.

Darkness then appeared on the field,

much to the regret of all. At times

the ball was scarcely visible. How-

ever, the Fildians continued to press

matters and within a short elapse of

time another count had been sent be-

hind Farrell, the St. Bon's goalie. With

only one goal dividing the score, play

became fast and furious for the hon-

ours, but the players were greatly

handicapped, their teams play on

account of the darkness. No further

goals were recorded and full time

sounded with the St. Bon's the victors

by a score of 4 goals to 3, and giving

them the right to meet the Collegians

in a play-off for the Championship.

FRENCH FEATHERWEIGHT DE-

FEATED BY HURLEY.

New York, Oct. 23.—Edouard Mas-

cart, featherweight boxing champion

of France, has met his first obstacle

in his tour of North America. Lew

Hurley, flashy mixer of Harlem, was

the obstacle and the latter arrayed

himself in Mascart's path here, last

night when the two met in a slashing

twelve round bout. The contest was

heralded by sportsmen as "one of the

fastest and most furiously contested

battles seen in a metropolitan ring in

many a day," and it was only by the

strongest kind of a finish that Hurley

managed to get the decision over his

French opponent.

Mascart, though defeated, was far

from disgraced, for he gave an excel-

lent exhibition of stamina and fight-

ing spirit. The pair fought toe to toe,

punch for punch, in the early rounds

and the battle was on an even foot-

ing until the tenth round when Hur-

ley opened up a slashing drive that

carried him to victory.

DEMPSEY MURDERED IN MEXICO

CITY.

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 27.—Jack

Dempsey, world's heavyweight boxing

champion, made a fighting entry into

Mexico City last night. Not that he

personally participated, but neverthe-

less his arrival was enlivened by nu-

merous fist fights among the huge

throng of admirers who gathered at

the station to greet him.

Soldiers with fixed bayonets were

hurriedly summoned to aid the police

in saving Dempsey from being crushed

to death by the frenzied mob. And

there were plenty of bloody noses and

cracked heads to show how well the

troops and the police kept their jobs.

The champion has come to Mexico

for a series of exhibition bouts with

his sparring partners. He will make

his appearance in the ring next Sat-

urday.

every drop of water is carefully

"washed."

The "laundry" where this is done is

right behind the scenes—a throbbing

nest of powerful engines. These which

constitute the pumping plant, suck

the water from the baths on to filter

beds.

The filter beds themselves consist

of layers of sand and gravel. It is es-

sential, of course, that these are not

fouled or choked in any way, conse-

quently the water, as it comes from

the baths, goes first of all through a

strainer.

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
