Red River Distress.

There is reason to fear that the distress at the Red River Settlement will prove to be a more scrious matter than was at first anticipated. An extract from a letter from the Rev. Mr. Black, published in the Globe, gives a definite idea of the state of matters in the colony: "All day on Wednesday our relief committee sat in the court room investigating the returns (20 in number) from all the parishes, as to the state of the people. The results are frightful. There are, at this moment, 484 families, consisting of 2,342 persons in want, and must be relieved or starve. Of the families, 237 are Protestant, and 247 Catholics. Of the persons, 951 belong to the former, and 1,391 to the latter persuasion. And besides these, there are (including by the churches), 48 families and 242 individuals, who have so little on hand, that they must be passed into the other class in a few weeks. And beyond these again, there are many more who, it is to be feared, cannot get through without help. So, I believe, we will be very little beyond the mark if we reckon the number of the necessition before the winter is over, at 3,000. Now, count what amount of flour this number would require for the five months between now and open water. At 2lbs. a day for each, I make it 4,500 barrels—or taking it only at our present number (say 2,400), 3600 barrels. We have 100 on hand, and about equal to 800 on the way. Where is the rest to come from? And how is it to be got in? The state of things is really appalling. The fishing also is a failure; and strange to say, not a rabbit is to be seem. Buffalo hunters, moreover, are returning with nothing; some are said to have eaten heir horses. Red River Distress.
