THE LONDON ELECTION.

Outside Opinion Regarding the At-
tempt to Steal Mr. Hyman's Seat.

Even Strong Conservative Journals
Ashamed of the Tactics Adopted
by Mr. Carling's Agents.

The inference is irresistible that the Con-
servative who had these "appealed" votes
placed on the list knew that they were bad,
and that they were put on so that, for the
time, Carling should get the seat under any
circumstances. The review counts so far
have declared the votes bad, but the Tories
are still appealing.

LONDON, March 2.—It is stated that Mr.
Ross, claims settler of the National Marine
Insurance Company, has been appointed
British arbitrator in the dispute between
Great Britain and the United States regard-
ing the Bering Sea differences.

Seven Drowned.
BERLIN, March 2.—A ferryboat was
wrecked at the breakfast at Lornien
yesterday, and five persons were drowned.
Two sons of Town Councilor Binder,
Staßfurt, were drowned yesterday
breaking through the ice on which they
were skating.

Savage Attack on a Judge.
LONDON, March 2.—While Judge Year-
wood was hearing a murder trial at Bombay,
a prisoner, a native of India, who was
charged with killing his victim with a
baton, seized the judge's hat and threw it
at his head before the officers could inter-
fere. After a long struggle the prisoner was
ironed. The judge may recover.

Rise in the English Death Rate.
LONDON, March 2.—The weekly returns
of the registrar of vital statistics show that
there was a rise in the death rate of Eng-
land during the past seven days. The rate
for all England was 23.4; for London, 24.4,
and for Derby, 29.9. The number of deaths
in London from diseases of the respiratory
organs was 401; primarily from influenza,
81; secondarily, 20. These figures cause
some alarm, and a number of experts have
predicted that the influenza epidemic is
about to be renewed.

Blizzard at Dover.
LONDON, March 2.—At Dover a perfect
blizzard is prevailing and the passage
across the channel is very rough. The
mail boat Ville de Bouvres, plying between
Dover and Calcutta, while attempting to
make the pier at Dover, was driven on the
rocks, but was afterwards towed off. On
the east coast of England the storm is
equally severe, and all ports are filled with
weather-bound vessels. The British steamer
Plate, from Liverpool, for Brazil, was
abandoned yesterday in a sinking condition
160 miles west of the Sicily Islands. Her
crew were taken off by the steamer V. V.
Taylor, which landed them at Falmouth.

British Press Comments on the Say-
ward Case.
LONDON, March 2.—The Post says:
"American lawyers are more skilled in in-
ternational law than are those of any other
nation. That Mr. Blaine relied upon
technical grounds for the defeat of the
appeal argues that he had no confidence
in his own cause."
The Times regrets the limitation of the
decision in the Sayward case, and the
signature of the Bering Sea arbitration
treaty to the same end. It says that the
decision is a victory for the United States,
and suggests that Mr. Blaine was anxious
to avoid taking the final step until he
was quite sure the ground would not be
cut from under his feet by the judges. The

On a Bed of Necessity.
LONDON, March 2.—In the House of
Commons Mr. Balfour is kept in continual
anxiety lest the Government's slender
majority should slip out of his hands. The
Liberal Unionists especially, who are get-
ting more and more despondent as to their
political future, show a tendency to desert
themselves on any and every pretext and
have to be watched by the whigs like a
lot of school boys. Sometimes it is like a
hide and seek between the Unionist
whips and the members they are after.
When brought face to face with their
dilemma the Unionists usually go in and
out, and vote, but most of those who can
keep out of the way do so.

The bill promoted by the corporation of
Belfast concerning the control of a lunatic
carnival game gave rise to a hot debate. The
fight turned on the insertion of a clause in-
tended to give the Catholics a large share
in the government of the town. Sir
William Harcourt and Mr. Balfour took a
hand in the debate, and when a division
was had it appeared that the Government
majority in favor of the bill was only 15.

Sensational Trial in London.
LONDON, March 2.—In the Police Court
at Bow street yesterday, before Sir John
Bridges, Maidland Francis Morland, de-
scribed as a tutor, aged 65, of 23 St. John
street, Oxford, was charged with attempt-
ing to obtain from Henry James, Lord
Rothfield, £70 and other moneys by false
pretences. Earl Russell testified that the
prisoner was a stranger to him, but that in
1888 he received a letter similar to the one
addressed to Lord Rothfield, purporting to
be from a very young widow, who informed
his Lordship that he could visit her, and
asking for a loan of £50. Earl Russell said
he foolishly replied to this letter, and that
the next year after his marriage engage-
ment he received an unsigned letter, saying
that some gentleman (without credentials)
had called upon Ruth Morland, and that he
had offered her £250 for the return of his
Lordship's letter. The Earl replied that he
would be glad to receive the information that
his letter had been destroyed, as he had
been a letter in September, 1889, declar-
ing that if his letter meant an offer of £50
for the return of his correspondence the

Bill in re Mortgages and Sales of
Personal Property.

Statistics Respecting Juvenile Offenders
—Learners' Grievances.

TORONTO, Ont., March 2.—In the Legis-
lative Assembly to-day Mr. Harcourt said
in reply to Mr. Glendinning, that Mr. The-
odore Walters, resigned his position of
temporary inspector of public works in the
north district on Jan. 20, 1892. No one
was appointed instead. Mr. Walters was
employed temporarily as superintendent on
Feb. 16.

A motion of Mr. Martens for a return
showing the amount of pine in unlicensed
districts disposed of since last session,
with the terms, amounts realized, and other
information, was adopted.

mortgages and sales of personal property.

Mr. W. J. Gray, president of the Re-

A return presented to the House showed
that the number of children arrested and
under 15 years of age, and brought before
any court in the Province during the year
1891 was 1,013; the number sent to the
common jail was 87; to industrial

girls, 63; otherwise disposed of, 805. The
number of such children who were tried
separate from other offenders at suitable
times appointed for that purpose, pur-
suant to the act for the better protection
and reformation of neglected children,
was 137.

A deputation from the Toronto Lease-

to him a memorial regarding the proposed
change to a lease in fee simple. They
thought that the law should be
changed so as to define the function of the

to be paid by salary, and, therefore, in-

half-hour.

Claims of the Baltimore's Crew.
WASHINGTON, March 2.—The claims of
the crew of the Baltimore for damages for
injuries and false imprisonment during the
Valparaiso riots have been filed at the
State Department. The total is \$2,055,000,
and the individual claims range from \$30-
000 to \$150,000.

A Printer's Fatal Mistake.
ANN ARBOR, Mich., March 2.—Fred L.
Earl, a printer at the Schiefel tagend-label
box factory at Ypsilanti, jumped from the
American express train near the Michigan
Central depot yesterday. He fell below
the wheels and had a leg cut off and his
body terribly mangled. He died at the
University Hospital last evening. Earl
was about 20 years old.

The Heleop Murder Trial.
HAMILTON, March 2.—B. B. Oaler,
Q.C., and Crown Attorney John Crear
will appear for the Crown in the case
against the alleged murderer of old John
Heleop, late treasurer for Ancaster town-
ship. Both prosecution and defense are
fully prepared with their evidence, and it
is the only criminal case on the docket for
the Assizes, which open March 9, the

streets, fell from the eleventh story to the
ground floor yesterday afternoon and was
not killed, but even made senseless. His
left leg was broken in two places above the
knee and three of the ribs on the left side
were fractured, and he received minor in-
juries. It is supposed that he struck some
of the elevator wires on the journey down-
ward, breaking the momentum. He was
perfectly conscious when found, and was
cheerful while his injuries were being at-
tended to and will recover, in all proba-
bility.

DEBATING AT OTTAWA.

The London Election Question Dis-
cussed in the House.

A Lively Skirmish Led by Hon. David
Mills, Who Will Demand That
Justice be Done.

[Special to the ADVERTISER.]

OTTAWA, Ont., March 2.—To-day prom-
ises to be a field day in the House of Com-
mons. Hon. David Mills will move his
motion for the preliminary and revised lists
of the London electorate, and may have
something to say about the matter. If he
does this interesting question will
excite a lively debate. Mr. Mills
is confident of being able to prove that
while the lists were in the hands of the
Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, and there
will be a large number of names were
added fraudulently. The Government
naturally will seek to shield an officer
who has been so particularly useful as the
Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, and there
will be a lively debate.

The Soulanges Canal scheme has at-

DEFENDING FOR DAMAGES.
The Defendant in a Breach of Promise
Suit Becomes the Plaintiff in a Suit
for \$5,000 Damages.

TORONTO, March 3.—Judge Morgan
occupied the bench at the County Court
sittings, which opened yesterday morning.
The first case was that of Coulter
vs. Dobie, both of whom are medical prac-
titioners in this city. Nearly a year ago
Dr. D. A. Dobie, a prominent doctor on
McCauley street, and Dr. Coulter, who is the
inventor and patentee of a combined in-
sulator and inhaler, entered into an agree-
ment whereby Dr. Dobie was to sell to
Chicago, manufacture and sell this in-
strument, he to be protected by a patent
which Dr. Coulter claimed \$1,000 for the
invention. Dr. Coulter claimed \$1,000
royalty for each instrument sold, and sued
Dr. Dobie for \$200. Judgment was given
in favor of the plaintiff. In view of this
decision, Dr. Dobie states he is counting
to be issued a writ for \$5,000 damages.
He bases his claim on the ground that he
left a lucrative practice on McCauley
street and went to Chicago, where he found
that Dr. Coulter had misrepresented the
instrument. The instrument, he says,
was to be patented on the idea of passing
steam through a medicated sponge, but he
found after reaching there that the facts
had been misrepresented to him. He states
that he lost over \$1,000 in Chicago, besides
his practice here, and will sue in the High
Court of Justice for \$5,000, charging fraud-
ulent representation.

Both litigants are Western Ontario prac-
titioners. Dr. Dobie hails from Glenora,
and was formerly a merchant in Wallace-
burg, and subsequently the defendant in a
breach of promise suit in Toronto, the
plaintiff being his former milliner.

IN LABOR'S FIELD.

Calculating the Effect of the Coming
Strike.

Nearly Half a Million British Miners
Will Take Part—Over 5,000,000
People will be Closely
Affected.

[Special to the ADVERTISER.]

LONDON, March 2.—As the time ap-
proaches for the inauguration of the strike
of coal miners who on March 12 will quit
work for two weeks with the object of com-
pelling such an increase in the price of coal
as will prevent mine owners from reducing
wages the effect on the Government can be
more readily gauged. It is certain that
over 1,000,000 employees will be thrown out
of work by this movement, and with their
families nearly 5,000,000 persons will be
directly or indirectly affected. The miners
themselves, 460,000 men, will take part in
the strike. The outcome is watched with
more than usual interest for the attempt is
on such a gigantic scale that every body
who uses coal will be either compelled to
pay increased prices for fuel, or in cases of
manufacturers close down their works.

At Sheffield, the rolling mills and the
works will be closed during the miner's
strike. This decision affects thousands of
cutlery, grinders and forgers. All the em-
ployes of engineering works, iron foundries
and wagon building works connected with
the coal mines have given notice that they
will suspend work. Thousands of railway em-
ployes connected with collieries will be
thrown out of work. The price of coal in
the Sheffield district has risen 3 shillings
per ton. In Dublin the price is 4 shillings
per ton higher.

TROUBLE IN THE IRON TRADE.
BIRMINGHAM, Ala., March 2.—The crisis
of the fight between the Alabama and
Pennsylvania iron product is felt to have
arrived. The market has gone to pieces,
and Birmingham furnaces have 100,000 tons
in their yards. The railways have been
called on to reduce freight to the lowest
possible point, and a reduction of 10 per
cent. in wages has been determined on.
