London, March 28.—The bloody engagements recently between imperial troops and rebels in Northern China re-sulted in the slaughter of several thousand killed and 45 wounded. Over 8,000 rebels were put to death with the sword. A number of engagements are reported. A number of engagements are reported. A house of insurgents, numbering 3,000, was covertaken by the imperialists at a place 60 miles from Kulun and over 100 of them were killed and 3 leaders made prisoners. Dispatches give details of several engagements, in one of which three-fifths of the rebels were killed and one-fifth made prisoners, among the latter being a leader who was instantly decapitated. A still larger force of the enemy was posted in the Chien-Chang district, where they had an encampment with guns filled up in the loopholes of the wall surrounding the villages. Churches of the new creed served as outposts of the rebels' army. An onslaught was made upon their position, and in an engagement lasting two hours 800 out of a total of 1,300 were put to the sword. About 500 of the rest were burned alive, and including stragglers it is estimated that not less than 1,400 of the enemy were put to the sword on this occasion. TORONTO, March 28.—The Legislative Assembly sat for only a few minutes this afternoon, and then adjourned out of respect to the memory of the late Mr. H. E. Clarke. Mr. Mowat and Mr. Meredith made brief but sympathetic addresses expressive of the loss sustained by the death of their colleague. The former was much affected, his agitation several times interrupting the course of his remarks.

Mr. Mowat said that the funeral of the late Mr. Clarke would take place at 3:30, and he would therefore move that the House, without transacting any business, adjourn as a mark of respect to the memory of the deceased. The suddenness and the circumstances of his death make it peculiarly solemn to all. [Special to the ADVERTISER.

The trouble was heart disease, with which he was afflicted for several years, and his disease had been growing worse. In view of the circumstances it is satisfactory to all to know that on the day of his death there was nothing exciting or disturbing, and nothing to ruffle the feelings of any one. The session had not been a stormy one, and on that day there was nothing unpleasant or of a personal nature. The question of nunicipal taxation was the one on which Mr. Clarke was engaged in expressing his opinion when he was suddenly arrested and sat down in his seat, as they all knew, and at down in his seat, as they all knew, and a few minutes was dead. Honorable

gentlemen on the other side of the House knew him better, but we have enough of him gentlemen on the other side of the House knew him better, but we on this side saw enough of him to cause us to regard him with 'respect and esteem. He was a strong party man, the licutenant of the Opposition chief, and leader of that side of the House in the absence of the chief. At the same time he was anxious to be on friendly terms with everyone so far as he consistently could. He was a genial man. He had many friends and no enemies. All will remember his genialty and his integrity. All will give him oredit for those qualities. They differed politically, but he [Mr. Clarke] expressed the views he conscientiously held. He loved to do the right, and supported or opposed measures because he believed he was in the right. He was a fluent speaker, he had a pleasant voice, and his observations showed his wide reading and excellent common sense. His successor may be a more brilliant man, a more noisy man, but the electorate will be fortunate if he is as good and as useful a man. WASHINGTON, March 28.—It is said on good authority that the President and his Cabinet are well pleased with the conciliatory tone of Lord Salisbury's note of the 26th inst., especially as it is held to concede the point that has been the principal cause of contention, viz., a renewal of the modus vivendi of last year for the protection of the seal fisheries.
