UNDER THE SEMAPHORE. ouble Tracking the Michigan Central
—July Earnings of American
Roads,

The M. C. R. will be double-tracked from Niagara to Detroit in time for the World's Fair at Chicago in 1892. The work is being pushed forward very fast.

Mr. Van Horne says he does not anticipate much trouble with the United States. They are not the kind of people to smash a dollar glass of their neighbor's while they have a ten-dollar glass of their own exosed.

Bradstreet's report says: "July was nonth of moderate gain in railway earning when the large increases last spring are cohidered. The percentage of gain is slightly arger than that for June.
