A CLANDESTINE MEETING.

BRANTFORD, Oct. 25.—The second day of he Hartley murder trial opened this morning at Brantford. Mrs. Woodward, who was carried from the witness stand in a fainting condition, again entered the box. She was unable to reconcile certain statements made by her at the examinations before the coroner and police magistrate and before the present court.

Gilbert Woodward gave evidence of a clandestine meeting between Ling and the prisoner at his house at Hawtrey. He saw them both with their arms locked in each other's. They were apparently on familiar terms. He saw the prisoner sit in the young man's lap, and he saw them walking around his house outside with their arms entwined in each other's. Witness' wife before them all had reproved her as a married woman with showing such unseemly behavior with a young man,

Fred W. Hartley swore that he had a conversation with Mrs. Hartley one day some two years ago. He was going down to Norwich, and she asked him to bring some "rough on rats," and not to give it to anybody but her when he returned, as she was afraid that the hired girl, who was a little weak in the head, might open the package and taste some of it.

Frank Allan saw the deceased on the Wednesday before he died; he told witness on that date that he felt a little better, and could eat more and stronger food; witness Wednesday before Hartley died; deceased | weeks in advance. had his face swollen and bloodshot eyes when he saw him last.

New Links in the Chain of Evidence Against the Prisoner.

FERGUS, Ont., Oct. 25.—Government Detective Murray arrived here this evening on the trail of Chattelle, and is securing a train of evidence around the prisoner that will be difficult to break. The fact of the prisoner having been seen here on Saturday last by several persons has created great interest in the development of the case.

WAS IT THE SAME MAN? STRATFORD, Oct. 26 .- The police here have information which leads them to believe that the prisoner made attempts to assault females in this immediate neighborhood. They say that one girl in this city was chased to the very door of her own house by a man who may yet be proven to be the prisoner, and that another girl was followed some distance along the St. Marys road, perhaps by the same individual.

The Japanese began to transport the main body of their army across the Yalu on the evening of Oct. 24. The work of crossing continued throughout the night, and at daybreak on Oct. 25 all the guns, horses and men had crossed without mishap and formed an emergency camp. In the meantime Col. Sato, who had taken a flying column on the morning of Oct. 25 for the purpose of reconnoitering, came upon the enemy, who occupied a fortified position near the village of Fu Shang on the right bank of the Ayi River. Col. Sato attacked the Chinese at l o'clock in the morning, the fight continuing until 6. The Chinese offered a stubborn resistance, but were ultimately driven out of their fortification and retired in disorder to Kulienchao. and rejoined the main army. Count that the Chinese engaged in the fight greatly exceeded the Japanese in numbers. His plans for the coming fight are completed. These contemplate the movement of several columns in a concerted and concurrent attack upon the Chinese from all sides. Already he says a network is being drawn around the Chinese, and it is expected that the attack will take place at daybreak on Oct. 27, though it may possibly be made earlier. Chinese outposts are retreating upon Rulienchiel, and the number of batteries there has increased to eleven. It is doubtful, however, that these batteries are fully armed. The weather is favorable.
