

Joint Stock Company Will Establish -The total membership of the Ancient Order of United Workmen is 350,000, not One in East London.

> Capital Expenditure Will Amount to \$50,000 - Inspection Before and After Killing-Small Fee to be Charged-Seeking Incorporation.
