Mr. Griffin, the celebrated English statistician, says that the British working-man gets from 50 to 100 per cent more money for 20 per cent less work than he did 50 years ago, a gain of from 75 to 120 per cent. Taking into consideration that nearly all the articles of consumption necessary to sustain life have greatly follows: of consumption necessary to sustain life have greatly fallen in price, a very large percentage could be added to this. He had further compared the increase of capital as being from £190. 000,000 to £400,000,000, or over 100 per cent, but the increase of the income of the manual labor classes only was from £170,000,000 to £550,000,000 or over 200 per cent. The amount of increase due to capital was about £210,000,000. while the total increase due to labor generally was £755,000,000. as against the £210,000,000 to capital during the last 50 years. His general conclusion was, therefore, that what had happen ed to the working classes in the last 50 years was not so much what might properly be called an improvement as a revolution of the most remarkable description.
