

Warning Sent To the Dutch

By the British Authorities in
Regard to Kruger.

Cautioned Against Violating the Neutrality Laws—Date of
the Canadians' Home-Coming—Reports From
Various Corps.

London, Sept. 29.—Great Britain has sent a note to the Dutch Government, according to a dispatch from Amsterdam to the Daily Mail, which contains a warning that, if Mr. Kruger is allowed to carry out his plan of bringing him to Europe, it will be regarded as a breach of neutrality on the part of the Netherlands.

The Berlin Times Zeitung publishes an article strongly advocating the offering of inducements to the Boers to settle in German Southwest Africa. Mr. Chamberlain, the colonial secretary, has written a letter in the course of which he says that, as the Dutch republics have been annexed, he does not expect any formal declaration of peace. He asserts he does not know whether the Queen intends to fix a day of national thanksgiving.

WANT TO BE FORGOTTEN.
Pretoria, Sept. 28.—It is stated that 17,000 applications have been made to join the new police force that is being organized for service in the Transvaal. The eagerness to join is ascribed chiefly to the popularity of Gen. Baden-Powell.

C BATTERY.
Major Hutton, commanding C Battery, in his report dated July 31, says, under date of July 1: Flour ration reduced to three-quarters pound per man. It may be mentioned that no biscuits or bread have been issued to the battery since May 1, the men being issued with one pound of flour per man in lieu of biscuits. The rations issued at this date are as follows: Flour, ½ pound; baking powder, ¼ ounce; fresh meat (beef), 1 pound; coffee, ½ (reduced to 1-6); tea, ½ ounce; sugar, 2 ounces; salt, ½ ounce; jam, ½ pound per man three times a week; rum, when specially ordered, such as on wet nights; lime juice, 1-10 gill, when ordered, or when vegetables are not available; tobacco, 1 pound per month.

Sir Wilfrid at Massey Hall, Toronto, Oct. 16.

Selections Made by the Latest Conventions—Macdonald Conservatives Fail to Agree.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier will speak in Toronto at Massey Hall on Tuesday, Oct. 16.

At a meeting of the executive of the Ottawa Liberal Association it was decided to call a convention to nominate candidates for the city on Oct. 16.

The Conservatives of West Middlesex met in convention at Glencoe on Monday, Oct. 8, to select a candidate who will oppose Mr. W. S. Calvert, M.P.

The Liberals of North Waterloo will meet in convention at the town of Waterloo on Friday, Oct. 12, to select a candidate for the Dominion Parliament.

The Conservative convention at Shawville, Que., for the county of Pontiac, selected Mr. J. H. Brabazon, of Portage du Fort, as the standard-bearer of the Conservative party.

A Liberal convention met at St. Stephen, N. B., on Friday and nominated Mr. Robert E. Armstrong, editor of the St. Andrew's Beacon, as the candidate for the Federal Parliament for Charlotte county.

It is reported at Ottawa that Hon. J. C. Patterson, lieutenant-governor of Manitoba, has notified the Conservatives of North Essex that he will accept their nomination if they can withdraw the nomination already given to Mr. Sel. White.

The Toronto Trades and Labor Council has decided to endorse the independent candidates in Center and West Toronto. This decision was arrived at only after a long discussion, and the vote resulted in a narrow majority for the motion favoring the support of the choice of the people's party.

A large and enthusiastic convention of Liberals of the county of Argenteuil was held in Victoria Hall last night, when by the unanimous choice of the meeting Dr. Thomas Christie, M.P., the old standard-bearer of the Liberal party in the county of Argenteuil, was again chosen.

John Bryden, manager of the Dunsinuir collieries, was nominated Thursday at the Conservative convention in Nanaimo, B. C., to contest the constituency of the island of Vancouver. A Conservative candidate against William Sloan, Independent Liberal, and Ralph Smith, Labor.

MACDONALD CONSERVATIVES.
Winnipeg, Sept. 27.—The Conservative convention for Macdonald was held at Portage la Prairie today. The delegates agreed to endorse a candidate, and after a lengthy discussion adjourned for ten days.

Hon. M. Sifton, Mr. McCreary, the Liberal candidate, and Mr. H. M. Howland, Q. C., addressed in large meetings of the Liberal party at Stonewall tonight.

THE SHAMOKIN OPERATORS

Report a Larger Number of Their
Men at Work.

President Mitchell Knows Nothing About Concessions Offered to the Strikers.

Shamokin, Pa., Sept. 29.—The operators in this vicinity were pleased this morning because a larger number of men than usual reported for work at Midway colliery, north of Mount Carmel. Since the strike was instituted, the colliery has been operated with more or less success.

Fifty-one cars of coal were shipped from the North Franklin colliery, near Trevorton, this morning, as a result of yesterday's work, the greatest in the history of the colliery. Ninety per cent of the men went to work this morning. Everything is quiet here. HAS HEARD OF NO CONCESSIONS.

Hazleton, Pa., Sept. 29.—President Mitchell said this morning that he knows no more today about any concessions on the part of the operators of the mines than he did yesterday. He added that he had received no information during the night or this morning on the subject of a settlement of the strike.

All mines that operated yesterday and heretofore in the Lehigh Valley are working as usual today.

Ashland, Pa., Sept. 29.—The Potts colliery was working today. Two hundred and ten boats of coal were hoisted yesterday, producing 29 cars of coal. This was practically the extent of coal mining in the Mahanoy Valley between Mahanoy City and Shamokin yesterday.
