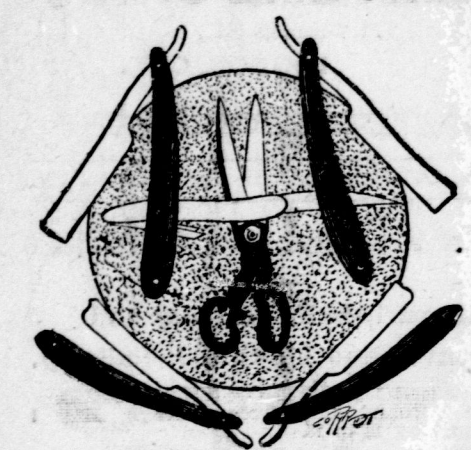

CHURCH OF ENGLAND IN
THIS CITY HAS PROSPERED

The Annual Meetings of Vestries
Were Held Monday Night.

Reports Show General Increase in
Receipts and Membership.

The annual meetings of the various Anglican Church vestries in the city were held last night, the principal business at each being the reading of the reports for the past twelve months and the election of officers for the ensuing term. On the whole it was shown that the Church of England in London had made good progress and that the outlook is bright for still better results in the future. The weather was very unfavorable for a large attendance at the meetings and the business had to be transacted by a few.

ST. PAUL'S CATHEDRAL.
The annual vestry meeting of St. Paul's Cathedral was held in the Bishop Cronyn Hall, with Rev. Dean Innes in the chair. Reviews of the past year's work were submitted and officers for the present term chosen. The most important change in the staff was made in the election of two new wardens to take the place of Messrs. W. T. Strong and James Mattinson, who desired to retire after several years' service. The new wardens are Messrs. H. E. Gates for the rector and F. W. Farncombe for the congregation, who desired to retire after several years' service. The reports of the wardens and the various organizations connected with the church were submitted to the members in pamphlet form. The wardens, Mr. A. E. Welch and Mr. W. J. Rowland, re-elected. Rooke, Stephens, Ross, McCadden, Salter, Richard, McCormick and Wingate; south, Welch, Hayden, Crawford, Rowlands, Woolverton, Westlake, Winder, Wilson.

Ushers—South, Messrs. C. J. Clarke, A. G. McCormick, J. A. Morgan and C. G. McCormick; north, Messrs. S. Brown, B. Logan, W. Evans and W. A. Rowland.

A vote of thanks was tendered the various societies of the church for the kind assistance given the wardens in their work.

At a subsequent meeting of the congregation Messrs. A. E. Welch and R. M. McElheran were re-elected lay representatives to Synod.

ST. JAMES CHURCH.
At the annual vestry meeting of St. James Church last night, the following members were present, Messrs. E. E. Nugent, J. Shaw, J. Holmes, J. H. A. Beattie, J. K. H. Pope, B. Cottam, B. Murray, W. Peacock, J. Hart, G. Phelps, J. Watson, G. Collier, W. Neil, A. Payne and T. Main.

The rector, Archdeacon Davis, opened the meeting with prayer. After the minutes were confirmed he gave a brief address in which he expressed gratitude for God's mercies. During the year they had missed Professor Harrison, who was ill. They were sorry to lose their faithful sexton, Mr. Foster, but he congratulated the congregation on having secured the services of Mr. Loney, who was courteous, painstaking and interested in the work. The wardens had done their work faithfully and well. It seemed clear to them that the debt on the church and school house was too large. The increase, the rector said, could be brought up to the requirements with a little effort. He and the wardens desired to thank the congregation for the support so cheerfully given to all branches of the church. The parish register showed that during the year there had been 11 marriages, 30 baptisms, 31 confirmed, 11 funerals and 1,475 visits made by the rector.

The financial statement, he said, spoke for itself.

The wardens' report was read by Mr. Shaw, and after some consideration, the rector said, the receipts for the year were \$4,165 \$3, not including that raised by the various societies of the church. The disbursements amounted to \$4,002 \$60, leaving a cash balance of \$162 \$75. The Sunday school statement shows receipts of \$271 \$9, and expendi-

ture of \$252 \$12, leaving a balance of \$10 \$65. The receipts of F. W. A. M. A. were \$127 \$5, and the Y. F. S. C. E. band \$124 \$14. The junior mission band had expended \$16 \$01 out of \$16 \$22 receipts; the Women's Helping Society, \$30 out of \$35 \$7; and the Y. F. S. C. E. \$22 \$78 out of \$23 \$79 receipts. This makes the grand total of \$4,331 \$19. The balance of assets over liabilities was \$20 \$62 \$28. In this balance sheet it says that an endeavor is being made to reduce the amount of the debt of \$6,500 by obtaining subscriptions covering a period of five years—the amount thus far subscribed being \$250. Miss E. S. Emery has kindly consented to act as treasurer of this debt fund.

Mr. Bettie moved, seconded by Mr. Shaw that this meeting express their sympathy with Prof. Harrison in his severe illness.

A resolution was passed to the effect that instead of the many collections now taken up there should be two, one in January for improving work outside of the diocese and the other in June for diocesan purposes.

ST. MATTHEW'S CHURCH.
At the vestry meeting of St. Matthew's Church, East London, the financial statement for the year was submitted, but the election of officers was deferred for two weeks. The report stated that the receipts totaled \$778 \$33, with disbursements of \$747 \$54, leaving a balance of \$30 \$79. The Ladies' Guild did remarkably well, raising \$560 \$31 and paying off \$500 on the church mortgage. The latter now stands at \$3,500.

The usual grant of \$100 was made to the Sunday school, and the vestry concluded by passing votes of thanks to the different branches of church workers.

The annual vestry meeting of Christ Church was held last evening in the schoolroom, the rector, Rev. J. H. Moorhouse, in the chair. The financial report was presented by the churchwardens, and was referred to the auditors. The results for the year were highly gratifying to all concerned.
