British Warship Sent to Tetuan, Will Not Be Ceded Away fo Morocco—Tribesmen Are Making Trouble.

Morocco.

London, Nov. 13. - A Rome correspondent says that Italian comments on Premier Balfour's Guildhall speech, referring to Somaliland operations. can scarcely be called enthusiastic, but the Tribune, the official organ, expresses satisfaction at what it considers the Premier's homage to Italian straightforwardness. The Tribune confirms the joint action of the British and Italian cruisers off the coast of Somaliland, remarking that Italy thus performed an act of friendship toward England, but has reserved all ulterior action.

THE PREMIER CAUSES DISMAY

His Proposal Regarding Old London's Underground

Railways.

London, Nov. 13. - Premier Balour's intimation that a royal commission may be appointed to consider the various schemes for the relief of London traffic has been received with something like dismay. It is assumed that the reference of the prospective tube bills to a royal commission will involve a grievous delay in their commencement, and possibly drive them over to the parliamentary session of 1904. By that time Yerkes will have almost completed the work of electrifying the district railway.

The appointment of such a commission, according to the view of solicitor of Messrs. Parks Yerkes, and the chairman of the district railway, will involve the hanging up of Mr. Morgan's and other schemes yet unsanctioned for two or three years, as a commission is not likely to report in less than that time. Meanwhile the Yerkes and Speyer schemes will go ahead. The matter was discussed today at a meeting of

the London county council. Mr. John Burns declared that the tube system was already obsolete. The people did not want to travel in bowels of the earth. The solution of traffic congestion lay in electric surface lines connected with congestpoints by shallow underground tracks, the present indications point the eventual establishment central control of all lines, which will have an important influence in the pending schemes.

TO FIGHT PEA WEEVIL

An Additional Campaign Through Farmers Institute.

Toronto, Nov. 13. - Mr. C. C. James Depute Minister of Agriculture, yessent out circulars to all the department correspondents, in order to ascertain the extent of the havoc wrought by the pea weevil this season. Ontario used to produce magnificent pea crops before the weevil got in its malignant work, and Mr. James says that if farmers would treat their peas properly the evil could be checked and profitable crops again grown. To this end the department will inaugurate and educational campaign this winter through the farmers' institutes, so as to instruct the farmers how to treat their peas to keep the weevil out.

CANADA'S TRADE STILL GROWING

Large Increase in Foreign Business-The Figures for Four Months.

Ottawa, Nov. 12 .- At the rate of expansion revealed by the trade returns of the four months which ended on Oct. 31, Canada's aggregate foreign commerce will show a gain of not less than \$37,000,000 when the fiscal year closes eight months from now. Taking the four months in question, the increase in our aggregate trade, on the basis of imports for consumption and exports of domestic produce only, was \$11,878,615, as compared with the same period of last year. The exports exceeded the imports by over \$10,000,000. The gain in imports as compared with the first four months of the previous fiscal year was \$4,116.658. The increase in exports was \$7,761,957. (Liberal), Kingston, would be dropped. NEW WHIP. When the new Legislature meets one of the first things to be done will be the election of a Whip by the Liberal members to succeed Mr. W. J. candidature. Great Season for Fishermen.

Toronto, Nov. 13. — Captain Mc-Aulay, of the Provincial fisheries cruiser Gilphie, reports to the department that herring in Georgian Bay are as "thick as water." AFRO-CANADIAN TRADE Discussed by Sir William Mulock-

Postmaster-General's Views.

Ottawa, Nov. 13. — Sir William Mulock addressed the Ottawa Board of Trade tonight on trade with South Africa. There was a good attendance It has been definitely decided to and the Postmaster-General was given a cordial reception. He spoke for an hour, dealing with present trade condition and taking a most optimistic view of the future. He referred to the recent colonial conference, and said that if Britain would give even a small preference the rest of the empire would fall in line. Sir William said trade within the empire should be the motto of the hour, and dilated on the greatness of the British possessions and the possibility of developing an enormous and profitable trade, independent of the other nations of the world. More steamship lines are required, and the line to South Africa will shortly be extended to Australia, touching the west coast at Freemantle and passing on to New Zealand. The Pacific line from British Columbia is insufficient, only touching at the east coast o' Australia. Mr. Mulock took a hopeful view of the trade with South Africt, and announced that ehe second Elder-Dempster ship would leave on the 18th inst. Already it has a full cargo.
