THE SITUATION IS SERIOUS

British Warship Sent to Tetuan, Morocco—Tribesmen Are Making Trouble.

Madrid, Nov. 13.—A dispatch received here from Tetuan, the seaport town of Morocco, where the Kabyle tribesmen have rebelled in consequence of the refusal of the local government to liberate certain Kabyles, including the murderer of an Englishman, shows that the situation has grown more serious. A body of armed Tetuanites has been defeated in a fight with the rebels and compelled to retreat to the town. The rebels are encamped at Sa-moa, half an hour distant from Tetuan, where all business is suspended. In Madrid the position of the Europeans at Tetuan is considered to be most grave. The newspapers comment on Spain's continued ill-fortune, again evidenced by the fact that the country is without a cabinet at the time of such an important crisis. Gibraltar, Nov. 13.—The British cruisers Furious, Pactolus and Prometheus have sailed from her for Tetuan, Morocco.

Friendly to Britain.

London, Nov. 13.—A Rome correspondent says that Italian comments on Premier Balfour's Guildhall speech, referring to Somaliland operations, are enthusiastic, and that the British and Italian cruisers off the coast of Somaliland, remarking that Italy thus performed an act of friendship toward England, but has reserved all ulterior action.

PORTUGUESE EAST AFRICA

Will Not Be Ceded Away for Some Time to Come—No British Offer.

Paris, Nov. 12.—With reference to the report that Germany and Great Britain intend acquiring Portuguese East Africa, M. De Souza Roza, the Portuguese Minister to France, said: "There is not one word of truth in the reports. Their very extravagance is sufficient proof of their inaccuracy, but I contradict them emphatically and unreservedly solely for the purpose of putting the public upon its guard, as I am convinced such reports are put into circulation for speculative purposes." "Portugal has not the slightest intention of parting with her colonial possessions nor of any portion of them either to Britain or any other power." "Furthermore, to prevent any possibility of error or misunderstanding, I may assure you that the British Government never has made any proposition, directly or indirectly, concerning Portuguese territory in Africa."

THE PREMIER CAUSES DISMAY

By His Proposal Regarding Old London's Underground Railways.

London, Nov. 13.—Premier Balfour's intimation that a royal commission may be appointed to consider the various schemes for the relief of London traffic has been received with something like dismay. It is assumed that the reference of the prospective tube bills to a royal commission will involve a grievous delay in their commencement, and possibly drive them over to the parliamentary session of 1904. By that time Yerkes will have almost completed the work of electrifying the district railway.

The appointment of such a commission, according to the view of the solicitor of Messrs. Parks and Yerkes, and the chairman of the district railway, will involve the hanging up of Mr. Balfour's and other schemes for the relief of London traffic for two or three years, as a commission is not likely to report in less than that time.

Meanwhile the Yerkes and Speyer schemes will go ahead. The matter was discussed today at a meeting of the London county council.

Mr. John Burns declared that the tube system was already obsolete. The people did not want to travel in the bowels of the earth. The solution of traffic congestion lay in electric surface lines connected with congested points by shallow underground tracks, the present indications point to the eventual establishment of central control of all lines, which will have an important influence in the pending schemes.

TO FIGHT PEA WEEVIL

An Additional Campaign Through Farmers Institute.

Toronto, Nov. 13.—Mr. C. C. James, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, yesterday sent out circulars to all the department correspondents, in order to ascertain the extent of the havoc wrought by the pea weevil this season.

Ontario used to produce magnificent pea crops before the weevil got in its malignant work, and James says that if farmers would treat their peas properly the evil could be checked and profitable crops again grown. To this end the department will inaugurate an educational campaign this winter through the farmers' institutes, so as to instruct the farmers how to treat their peas to keep the weevil out.

CANADA'S TRADE STILL GROWING

Large Increase in Foreign Business—The Figures for Four Months.

Ottawa, Nov. 12.—At the rate of expansion revealed by the trade returns of the four months which ended on Oct. 31, Canada's aggregate foreign commerce will show a gain of not less than \$37,000,000 when the fiscal year closes eight months from now. Taking the four months in question, the increase in our aggregate trade, on the basis of imports for consumption and exports of domestic produce only, was \$11,578,615, as compared with the same period of last year. The exports exceeded the imports by over \$10,000,000. The gain in imports as compared with the first four months of the previous fiscal year was \$1,116,653. The increase in exports was \$2,011,857.
