Regarding the report that the Rus sian fleet had arrived at Ma San Pho, Baron Hayashi remarked that Russia has only about thirty war vessels in the whole far east and it "would be a physical impossibility, on account of coal and other supplies," the min-ister further asserted, "for them to remain at Ma San Pho.
