

HERE'S A BOY WHO CONGO REGION HAS X-RAY EYES A PLAGUE SPOT

He Can See Through Clothing
and Flesh.

IS ALSO A HYPNOTIC SUBJECT
THE WOMEN SUFFER THE MOST

Can Diagnose Cases Baffling to Ex-
perienced Physicians, Thanks to
His Uncanny Faculty.

New York, Aug. 9.—Leo Brett, son of Dr. Frank W. Brett, has become the most interesting boy in the vicinity of New York to physicians and surgeons, says a South American N. Y. dispatch. Leo is not a "case." Rather, he is a condition, as through a person's body as accurately as though a person were a mere cage of bones. He not only sees the internal organs, but he also the organs, all in their colors, normal or abnormal; he sees the blood coursing through the arteries, and can trace absolutely the threads of the nerves.

His father, Dr. Brett, uses this power of Leo to help him in diagnosing the cases that come to him.

"I have not seen this thing," says Dr. Brett, "for the sake of the dignity of my profession. I discovered it by accident, and I was content to submit the boy to hundreds of tests to remove any possible chance of a hoax. A word suggestion was reacting through Leo."

"For a long time I was skeptical about hypnotism, and even after I began taking lessons I thought the subject they gave me to work with at the school might be trained ones. I even doubted whether I was not in the hands of charlatans, and thought it might be that my subjects were helping me."

He began, therefore, to repeat my work at home. At that time my elder boy, Leo, was 8 years old.

"One day, when I had him in this state, I said to him, 'Leo, I want you to see an old Colic fracture which I had gotten when I was 8 years old, and which I had forgotten.'"

"I told my boy to close his eyes, then to rest, and finally told him he was ready. He then became in a normal state."

"The thing was so astonishing that I began to try him on various subjects. He said that when he was in that condition where he had the power to see through the person's body as a smoke, dark liquid, and flashes of blinding green light, as we see in the Crookes tube. Indeed, it was to that light which he saw the organs and bones of the human body. Of course, nothing has been said to him, and the boy can see perfectly through a person's raiment."

Finally his father, who was a doctor, wanted Leo to examine him. I didn't want to take the case at all, but he insisted, and Leo made the examination. "By way of proving Leo's testimony I said that if there was a kink it could be determined by a tenderness of the part. Sure enough, pressure caused immediate and severe pain."

"I shall not tell you of all his cases, for he has had more than I can write. The record of them, as I ought to have done, for I did not at first appreciate what the boy was doing. Leo is now a pupil in the school of Dr. Brett. He is clever, though not precocious at his studies.

WRONG MAN SUFFERED

Imprisonment and Disgrace Through
Mistaken Identity.

London, Aug. 9.—At a little table in an Oxford street restaurant there sat the other night a gray-haired, middle-aged man, who was beaming through a pair of eyeglasses at a little group of friends who surrounded him.

This man was Adolph Beck, who, during the afternoon, had been released from the Oxford street restaurant, where he had been incarcerated, as the result of one of the most amazing and distressing cases of mistaken identity known in the annals of crime.

In April last he was convicted for obtaining articles from various women by means of fraud, but so stoutly and earnestly did he protest his innocence that the judge forbore to pass a sentence. Now it has been proved to the satisfaction of Scotland Yard that Beck's protestations were true.

Put briefly, Adolph Beck's story is as follows:

In December, 1895, he was standing at the door of his lodgings when a woman came up and gave him into custody on the charge of stealing her watch.

At the police station he was detained, and as other women appeared and declared that he had stolen various articles from them, he was committed to prison.

Beck was sentenced to five years' penal servitude, but through his persistent assertions of his innocence, he was eventually released.

Upon coming out of prison, Mr. G. R. Smith, who knew Beck, before, espoused his cause, and a number of independent gentlemen were found who swore that they had never seen Beck in prison when he was supposed to have been committing offenses in England in 1877.

Then came the irony of Beck's fate. He was, he believed, on the point of proving his innocence to all the world when, in April last, he was again convicted of defrauding women.
