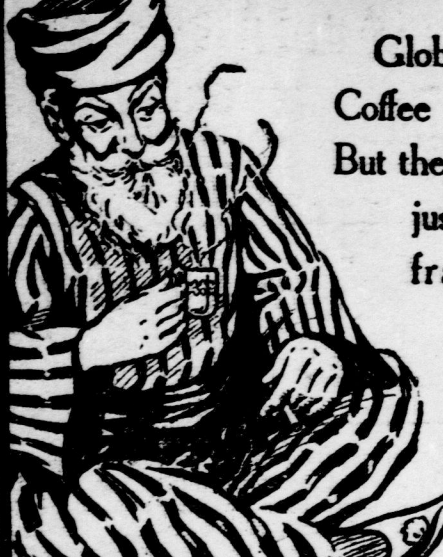

position and confidence in him were
moved by Mr. Alex. Mustard, Bruce-
field, and Mr. J. G. Stanbury, of Ex-
eter.

The Candidate's Address.

Mr. Kellerman was given a rousing
reception on arising. He felt that the
Liberals had done him a great honor
in giving him the nomination. Had he
acted as his feelings prompted, he
would have remained at home, because
of what might happen. He was proud
of the fact that the nomination was
unanimous. The task was a heavy one,
because of circumstances of a purely
personal character. He was in the
field, and he was in to win. There
would not be any turning back. South
Huron must be redeemed, and it would
be redeemed. Mr. Kellerman declared
that although the task was a heavy
one, he was willing to try it, and do
his level best. He had been the unani-
mous choice of the convention, and he
knew that the party was behind him
to a man.

Urges Hard Work.

"I will do my duty. I want the party
to stand behind me, and I know it will.
South Huron can only be redeemed by
every man doing his duty. The star
is rising in the east. The dark days
are past. The Whitney Government
has not given us what the Government
promised. Let us work heartily, for
the day is coming when Hon. A. G.
MacKay will be leader of the Govern-
ment of Ontario" (longed cheers).

An Ovation For Mr. MacKay.

Hon. A. G. MacKay was given a tra-
spondent ovation upon rising to speak.
It was some minutes before he could
begin, and he was listened to with the
closest attention for an hour and a
half. He said:

"I am sure I appreciate the senti-
ments expressed in the resolution you
have just passed. This is the first con-
vention I have addressed since having
been chosen for the somewhat heavy
task of leading the Liberals in the
House, and I hope leader of the Lib-
erals out of the House. Some time
ago, that little band of 28 Liberals in
the House held a meeting, and chose
me their leader. I will confess to you
that I preferred to live my own
life rather than accept the great re-
sponsibility. I was wedded to my pro-
fession, and I would rather have prac-
ticed that profession, but there seemed
to be no way out of it, and I accepted.
This afternoon I will stand with you
some of the policies of yesterday, to-
day and tomorrow, and let you judge
for yourself if they are mere twaddle."

"But before I go into my speech
proper, I want to congratulate you on
the choice of Mr. Kellerman as your
candidate. I regard him as a very
strong man, a worker, and a loyal Lib-
eral. I like very much the unanimity
of the convention in every sense of the
word. Liberalism is still a militant
spirit. There is no lack of life in the
Liberals of Ontario. Mr. Kel-
lerman ought to be a good man, for he
came from good stock. There never
has come to the shores of Canada a
better immigrant than the German.
Mr. Kellerman is from that stock, and
he will do honor to the splendid race
from which he sprang. He is a worthy
type of man, and I am sure the Lib-
erals of South Huron will rally loyally
to his support."

As to a Platform.

"I have been asked to formulate a
platform, and have been censured for
not doing so. No leader of a party
should formulate a policy alone. There
is no better place for formulating those
policies than in the primaries. Some-
times that a great convention be called,
where delegates from all over the
Province may attend. Then a resolution
committee will be appointed. Resolu-
tions will then be drawn up, passed in
a hurried meeting of the party, and
the policy of the party formed.
Policies should be discussed in the
primaries. Delegates fully instruct-
ed along the lines of the policies ad-
vocated should be sent to the conven-
tion, and a policy broad-based on the
people's will result."

The Brockville Election.

"Mr. Whitney lays great store upon
the recent Brockville by-election, and
characterizes it as of tremendous im-
portance. He calls it a decisive victory,
and indicates what is going to happen
at the next general election. I refer him
to West Middlesex. During the
Brockville by-election there were only
about three meetings held by each
party. In West Middlesex fully a
dozen or more meetings were held
by each party. Many cabinet ministers
went down there. The electors heard
the policy of the Government ex-
plained, and heard the explanation of
it. You know the result. The electors
of Ontario like the Conservative policy
the best when they do not hear any-
thing about it. When they hear it
fully explained they defeat the Govern-
ment candidate."

Urges Reformation.

Mr. MacKay then went into an ex-
haustive criticism of the Whitney
Government policy. The greatest
matter before the people of Ontario
today was reforestation. Mr. Thomas
Southworth, an expert, had figured
out that with a proper policy in the
matter of reforestation, an income of
\$30,000,000 could be derived every
year. When it is considered that the
total revenue of the Province at this
time was only \$7,000,000, the impor-
tance of the matter is apparent.

"If Mr. Southworth's figures are
within a thousand miles of being cor-
rect," said the speaker, "the im-
portance of reforestation is demon-
strated. If his plan were carried out
the Province of Ontario would have
four and a half times its present re-
venue derived from forest, mines, lakes
and all such. If by natural growth
and reforestation we could get that
income, what could we not do for
agriculture, arts and education?"

I tell you it is the most important sub-
ject before the people of Ontario to-
day. It cannot be solved as Mr. Whit-

ney is doing it by appointing Prof.
Fernow to a chair and letting him
treat the subject academically. It is
not an academic subject. It is a
practical subject, and should be treat-
ed in a practical manner by a
practical man. I leave you to judge
whether this is mere twaddle."

Another Whitney Failure.

The reform of the civil service was
another policy which Mr. Whitney
had advocated, and had utterly failed
to introduce. Men should be appoint-
ed to these positions because of merit,
and promoted or transferred as the
efficiency of the service demanded.
The spoils system should be kept out
of the civil service.

Mr. MacKay had asked for law re-
form to simplify the practice of law,
hasten appeals and such. Absolutely
nothing had been done in this matter.
He declared that he had no confidence
in the present attorney-general to
bring about the needed reforms.

The Whitney Government's financial
policy came in for a scathing criti-
cism. The Opposition had advocated
certain reforms in the financial policy.
The Conservatives had laughed, but
afterwards Hon. Frank Cochrane
adopted the suggestions of the Op-
position. Mines were no longer as-
sessed at a low rate, but on a royalty
basis. The Conservatives were going
to do away with the succession duties
act, but today it is one of the Govern-
ment's chief sources of income.
The same was also true of the sup-
ply of money to the party of the day.
There have been mere twaddle, but the Con-
servatives found them good enough
to adopt.

The inefficient management of the
department of education, the partisan
enforcement of the liquor licenses, and
the iniquitous spoils system were all
unparaphrasedly criticised. The shuffling
attitude of Hon. Dr. Pyne on the rural
school laws, the merciless and shame-
less attitude of the liquor license com-
mission, the outstanding figure in the
politics of the empire, Canada was
destined to occupy a great place in
the destiny of nations, and the
pride of Canadians was due to the
greater leader of the Liberal party
in Canada.

Mr. M. Y. McLean.

Mr. M. Y. McLean, Seaford, the
Federal Liberal candidate for South
Huron, was the next speaker. He was
pleased to greet the Liberals of South
Huron, and delighted to know that
the convention had nominated Mr. H.
K. Kellerman for the local house. There
was no man in South Huron whom he
would rather have as running mate
than Mr. Kellerman. He was con-
fident that with the splendid
support of the Liberals of South
Huron, this riding would be redeemed
to the cause of Liberalism. He was
satisfied that the party would rally to
their support.

The speaker paid a glowing tribute
to Hon. Mr. MacKay. There was abso-
lutely no doubt but that he was the
best man in the right place. He was
a leader in every sense of the word.
Mr. MacKay was rooted and grounded in
Liberal principles. He took the stand
that the Government should be by the
people. The Liberal party stood for
the people. It was the party of the
people. The speech of Mr. MacKay
had shown that he was in touch with
the people, and there was no doubt
that he would shortly lead the
Liberal party to power. There was
no doubt that the people of Ontario would
have a Government that would be of the
people. The Liberal party had fought and
died for the principles of Liberalism and
responsible Government. There was
danger at present from an oligarchy
worse than the Family Compact.

Mr. McLean then went into a scath-
ing denunciation of the enforcement of
the liquor laws in South Huron. Capable
men had been removed from the
commission and in their place were
substituted men who were extreme
partisans. A proper administration
of the liquor laws was promised by
Mr. MacKay, but Mr. P. P. and other
Conservative speakers. The commis-
sion thought that in a small village
called Khiva in the riding, there was
a hotel, and a commission was
decided to cut the hotel off. Mr.
Barney Cunningham went to see Harry
Elber, the member, and during that in-
terview sulphur smoke was seen to
come from the windows, if the word
of spectators were to be believed.
Shortly after that interview, the
license commission saw new light on
the matter, and as a result, the license
was not cut off. There was no danger
that the license will be cut off. Mr.
McLean pointed out that Mr. Cun-
ningham was an active Conservative
worker.

In Exeter, the commission decid-
ed that there was not enough population
in that town for so many hotels, and
it was decided to cut off a certain
hotel owned by two Liberals. The
hotel then passed into the hands of a
pounded, and then again the
commission saw a new light. It
was suddenly found that the popula-
tion had increased greatly, and there
were sufficient to support the extra
hotel. Such was the record of the
party in this riding. More could be
said, but the instances quoted were
sufficient to show the partisan nature
of the administration of the license
laws.

Mr. McLean then paid a splendid
tribute to the services of Sir Wilfrid
Laurier in the government of this
nation. The Liberal Government has
enacted legislation immensely valuable
to the people of Canada, especially on
behalf of the farmer. The Govern-
ment had ever done so much for the
farmers as this Government.

Mr. McLean, in his concluding re-
marks, declared that the outlook for
the party in South Huron was very
bright, and he expressed the great
confidence in the leadership of
Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and the assur-
ance that he would continue to guide
the affairs of this growing nation for
many years yet.

The meeting concluded with cheers
for the candidates, Hon. Mr. MacKay,
Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the King.
