BREAK EVEN AND
ARE STILL AHEAD
EEL WINS RACE
IN EASY ORDERGiants Win and Loose Game With Phillies, Retain-
ing Lead.

Philadelphia, Oct. 1.—New York broke even with Philadelphia here on Thursday and thereby retained the lead in the National League race.

The visitors knocked Corridon off the rubber in the first inning of the opening contest, but the home team bunched hits off Mathewson and tied the score in the fourth inning. In the last five innings Philadelphia could get only two hits off Mathewson, while Richie held his opponents down to three hits during these sessions. New York scored the winning run in the sixth inning. With Devin on first and two out, Magee muffed a drive by Needham, the former scoring.

Covaleski held New York to four hits in the second game and the home team won easily. They knocked Wiltsie off the rubber in three innings and also touched up McGinnity's curves. New York's runs were scored in the sixth inning on two bases on balls and Donlin's double. The scores:

THE BIG FIGHT
FOR THE PENNANTHere Are Some Possible Fin-
ishes and You Can Take
Your Choice.

Detroit, Oct. 1.—The east is gone and the clubs from the land of the rising sun did nothing to affect the pennant race, beyond, at the start, pulling the Tigers down.

It has reached the stage where all possible combinations can now be figured out. Each contender has five games to play. The possible results are all figured out in the following tables:

Against Cleveland and Chicago playing against each other Friday and Saturday, the one big chance of the Tigers is at hand. If they can take two from St. Louis with the two contenders breaking even the percentage would be:

Detroit.....	89	61	.593
Cleveland.....	88	63	.583
Chicago.....	86	63	.577

This would make the pennant almost safe for the Tigers. Cleveland could take all three games from the Browns and the Tigers would have to take two of the three in Chicago to win. If Cleveland should happen to drop one to St. Louis the Tigers would only have to take one from the Sox to win. In other words, if the Tigers take three of the remaining five games, Cleveland will have to take four of their five to beat them out, while Chicago will have to win all five.

The best combination for the Tigers would be for Chicago to take both games from Cleveland and Detroit to take both from St. Louis. This would leave it as follows:

Then Chicago would be the club to fight it out with the Tigers, and they play against each other. The Tigers would have to win but one of the Chicago series to clinch the pennant, regardless of what Cleveland did in St. Louis. Figuring this way and granting Cleveland all three of the St. Louis games the percentage would be:

That half game lead gives the Tigers the big edge in the fight. Three of the remaining five games will give them the flag almost to a certainty unless the Naps take both games from the Sox and beat St. Louis.

There can be no games played after the date of the season's close, so during the remaining five days of the race the weather will be watched with feverish anxiety. Rain may yet come down and spoil the whole thing.
