PEARY'S ADVANCE MESSAGE

Gives Dates of Progress to the Top of the World and Back and Records the Drowning of Professor Marvin, the Meteorologist

Commander Peary is still at Battle Harbor slowly moving southward toward North Sydney, Nova Scotia, and thence to United States ports. No further word has come from him to any quarter concerning the momentous
