REV. DR. HERRIDGE

ON CONDUCT OF LIFE

Eloquent Address by Noted Divine From the Capital.

"The common evil of today," declared Rev. Dr. Herridge, in lecturing on "The Conduct of Life," in the First Presbyterian Church last night, "is not that we indulge too much in pleasure, but that we are satisfied with cheap, tawdry pleasures. We are pleased and amused too easily."

"We never get too much of life; we get too little. Some people decry earthly things and apologize to themselves for enjoying them. When one depreciates the present world he loses the power of moral stimulus. We should have an intensive interest in things. The trouble is, we think too much of the future and far too little of the present."

"To attain a high standard we must not affect disregard for things around us. We must feel a comradeship with the busy world, with the toiling hands and selling brains. In this world of music, science, splendor and opportunity we must also hear the voice of wearied souls crying for release from ignorance and sin."

"Self-respect is necessary to the conduct of life. Self-respect means self-government, and virtue is an achievement in itself. Self-control is the true preparation for self-development. Struggle for purity is a proof of greatness, and the ceaseless challenge for the unattainable develops character, but idleness is an immorality which is a menace to the state and individual."

INTRODUCED IN A DEAD SILENCE

No Cheers For Arthur Gilbert

Member From Drummond-Arthabaska.

SPEEDY PARTY'S FAILURE

Hon. William Paterson Showed Up the Different Attitudes of Conservatives on the Navy Question.

Ottawa, Nov. 28.—Something in the nature of an anti-climax to all the recent excitement over the Drummond-Arthabaska election occurred in the Commons today, when the victorious Nationalist, Arthur Gilbert, received the cut direct from the assembled House on his introduction. When the new member, accompanied by Messrs. Monk and Foster, entered the chamber, he was received with frigid but eloquent silence, not the faintest semblance of a cheer being raised.

Evidently fearing that anything in the shape of a greeting might be regarded as another indication of their sympathy with the Nationalist cause, the Conservative members who a few weeks ago were applauding the victory of Mr. Gilbert, fidgetted in their seats, and remained dumb, while the Liberal members gazed curiously, but also undemonstratively, upon the scene.

Amid a silence that was almost painful in its intensity, Mr. Monk, speaking in French, informed the speaker that Mr. Gilbert had taken the oath of allegiance and signed the roll, whereupon the speaker courteously invited the new member to take his seat and the victor in a historical contest, whose name was on everybody's lips a few weeks ago, stalked to his place in the Opposition back benches, with not a sign of recognition from his fellow members of Parliament. It was a spectacle which old parliamentarians say is without a parallel in the history of the Dominion Parliament.

Mr. Paterson's Arguments. Contrary to expectations, the end of the debate on the address was not reached tonight. Today's discussion was notable for a rousing speech by Hon. Wm. Paterson, who exposed the inconsistencies of the Opposition on the question of naval defence with great force and effect, and tore the amendment of Mr. Borden to shreds. The minister of customs was particularly effective in his contrast between the position of the Conservatives two years ago and last session, when they were in opposition, and their policy of doing nothing now, and the House roared with delight when he labelled them the "speedy party," whose paper currency was the "speedy party."

Dr. Black, Hants, introduced a bill to amend the Canada medical act by providing for the regulation of medicine, that any qualified medical practitioner, entitled to practice medicine in any province may practice in any part of the Dominion.

Dr. Sproule contended that in adopting the naval policy without consulting the people the Government had no right to feel that it was the policy of the Government. He dared the Government to submit either the question of the navy or the question of the people to a referendum, and did so the result of Drummond and Arthabaska would be repeated in seven out of every ten of the rural districts of Ontario. It was because of the growing spirit of nationalism that the people were becoming alarmed and distrustful of the Government.

Hon. William Paterson. Hon. Wm. Paterson regretted to find Dr. Sproule taking the position that Canada with eight million people should do nothing to protect her own interests. It was a position scarcely worthy of the member for East Grey. Directing his attention to Mr. Borden's amendment Mr. Paterson recalled the resolution proposed by Mr. Foster two sessions ago, calling upon the Government to do nothing to protect her own interests. He was amazed to read in the press that the leader of the Opposition had taken a different view, and was urging that \$25,000,000 should be handed over to Britain to be spent where, when and how it would.

This year there was still another change. "If there ever was in any legislative assembly a party of the opposition," declared Mr. Paterson, "last year the Opposition proposed an alternative in the shape of a contribution to the British navy. This year they proposed to stop the construction of the Canadian navy and to do nothing at all for Britain."

Paper Currency Locality. "Who is the party of the opposition?" demanded Mr. Paterson. "Is it because the member for Jacques Cartier (only) who has tried to read out of the party, still in the party, and has assumed the leadership of it?" Mr. Paterson suggested that it had been borne in upon the leader of the Opposition by some of his followers that something had to be done to show that there was an understanding between the Conservative party and the Nationalist party. "What will some of their imperial friends in the old country think of them?" asked Mr. Paterson. "Last year they were willing to offer \$25,000,000 for Dreadnoughts. This year they assure his excellency of their unalterable devotion to the British crown." There had been so much use of the paper currency of the Tory bank of loyalty that the people were beginning to think it had no gold basis of action. That currency had become so depreciated that no responsible shipbuilder would take a cartload of it to build a fishing smack. Mr. Borden's amendment declared that Canada was prepared to fulfill its responsibilities to the Empire, but Mr. Paterson pointed out that Mr. Monk's view was that these responsibilities had already been discharged. He believed the people would be disgusted with the attitude of the Opposition in standing on the ground of the Nationalists, and would stand by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the Liberal party, who have been consistent throughout and straightforward.

Mr. Blain. Mr. Blain arose to some length in favor of the proposal to hand over to the Western Provinces the ownership of their lands, and defended the position of the Conservative party on the question of defence.

Mr. Miller said that, judging these members by their actions, he did not think they could be deemed loyal. The actions of Messrs. Foster and Taylor in sending Mr. Borden to the House of Commons to charge other members with disloyalty.

The speaker did not think Mr. Miller had made any direct charge of disloyalty.

Operation of Elevators. Mr. Schaffner (Souris) has given notice of a resolution declaring that the present system of operating terminal and transfer elevators is detrimental to the interests of the western grain producers, and that the Government should take immediate steps to operate terminal elevators at Fort William and Port Arthur, and the transfer elevator between those terminals and the Atlantic seaboard.

DEATH OF K. P. GILLMOR. St. John, N. B., Nov. 28.—The death is reported at St. George, Charlotte County, of K. P. Gillmor, uncle of Hon. Senator Gillmor, and brother of the late A. H. Gillmor, who represented Charlotte in the House of Commons for upwards of 30 years.
