INDICATES SLAYER ON HIS DEATHBED

James Fox Tried to Save Johnson From Gallows.

Fort William, Nov. 2.—Partly recovered from an insane fit, during which he mortally wounded James Fox on Sunday, Dave Johnson is now in the cells awaiting trial, being brought in by Constable Stringer last night. The charge is softened somewhat by the heroic action of his victim, who, on his death-bed, made a statement vindicating Johnson, on the ground that he was not mentally responsible for his actions. That the dead cook, who breathed his last yesterday afternoon in McKellar Hospital, is entitled to a higher human respect is evident from the fact that he died trying to save a fellow-workman from possible suicide. When informed that his hours were numbered he made an attempt to have the other cook released from the murder indictment by the statement that the man did not know what he was doing.

RECIPROCITY

(Continued From Page One.)

No detailed proposals on either side have yet been made. As a matter of fact the whole question rests just where it did when Messrs. Fielding and Knox exchanged notes last March, declaring that the matter of free trade might be advantageously discussed at a later date.

The Probable Course. The Government here is prepared to courteously discuss with the American Government President's Taft's proposal for mutually benefiting the trade of both countries. It is believed that the opportunity of American and Canadian economic advantage will result in a trade agreement which cannot but be profitable to Canada. And to refuse the opportunity would be political folly. It is probable that the matter of free trade will be held after the preliminary discussion of next week, and during the interval the tentative proposals made will be discussed by the respective Governments at Ottawa and Washington. Secretary Knox will personally participate in the conferences later on. It is hardly likely that any final agreement can be reached before the new year, and in any event any agreement must be submitted to Parliament for ratification.

Columbus, Ohio, Nov. 2.—In a speech here tonight, Secretary Knox said: "I am glad to say that still another forward chapter in our commercial relations may be written during Mr. Taft's administration. It is one that I am sure will meet the approval of the American people. There is good prospect that the ties between us and our Canadian kinsmen will be drawn closer by means of the bond of commerce."

"A reciprocity of sentiment on this subject now exists in both countries," said Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who has done so much for Canada, has declared his belief that it is possible to make a treaty with the United States which will be of advantage to both. His aspiration is for a treaty which will be equally profitable to one and the other. This is also the aspiration of the president."

NINE WERE INDICTED FOR LAND GRABBING

Men Charged With Driving Settlers Away With Guns.

Omaha, Neb., Nov. 3.—Indictments returned by the federal jury yesterday against nine ranchmen of Western Nebraska were made public today. The indictments charge conspiracy to drive from their claims at the points of guns, homesteaders who took sections of semi-arid land under the Kinkadee homestead law.

Several ranchers, Yeast and his associates among them, depended on this land for their livelihood. The ranchmen indicted are: Perry S. Yeast, of Hyannis, Neb.; his son, Frank W. Yeast; Leslie E. Ballinger, M. C. Hubbel, Emil Anderson, Wilcox Z. Emerson, Harry Sutton, Boone E. Hawthorne and Dr. Harry H. Huff, Dr. Huff, a prominent physician, and Mr. Sutton, county attorney of Garden County, are members of the insanity board. Yeast, one of the largest ranchers in the state, was convicted two years ago of fraudulently securing title to homestead land, and paid a fine and served a jail sentence.

According to the charges made in the indictment, Yeast and his associates tried their efforts so far as to secure the incarceration in the insane asylum at Hastings, Neb., of one of the alleged victims.

The indictment charges that a band of about 30 persons, headed by Yeast, went to the homes of many cowboys, homesteaders, and by intimidation and threats of taking their lives and those of their families, forced them to leave their claims.

Sensational Case. The specific case of J. Davisher is mentioned in detail. It is charged that Yeast and the other defendants, accompanied by a band of cowboys, visited Davisher's home and after threatening himself and family with death if he did not leave the country, destroyed his home, broke up his machinery, cut his harness to pieces and in other ways mistreated him. Later, according to the indictment, Yeast conspired with members of the county insanity board, and secured Davisher's incarceration in the asylum.

This latter act, according to the indictment, was committed in a high-handed manner. The insanity commission, it is alleged, went through a mock examination, declared Davisher insane, and issued a warrant for his arrest. This was served on the spot and within an hour he was rushed off to the asylum, without being permitted to have the advice of counsel.

Davisher's case was brought to the attention of the superintendent of the institution, who conducted an examination into the case. He at once decided Davisher was not insane and the latter was released by habeas corpus proceedings.

According to an official order from the department the present indictment covers one of the most remarkable attempts at land-grabbing which has recently been brought to the attention of the department. A letter written by one of the victims to President Taft is said to have caused the investigation which resulted in the indictments being returned. A special grand jury was summoned to consider the evidence.

BRITAIN TO DIVIDE COLONIAL OFFICE

Will Create a New Department for the Self-Governing Dominions.

London, Nov. 3.—It is unofficially stated that a new secretary of state will be appointed shortly, and a new department created to attend to business made by the self-governing dominions, the affairs of which will henceforward be entirely separated from the colonial offices. The arrangement has arisen out of the work of the imperial conferences held in recent years, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and Newfoundland will be associated in the new department. All the crown colonies will continue under the control of the colonial office.

SHORTER HOURS AT STRATFORD SHOPS

Usual Reduction for Winter Has Gone Into Effect.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Stratford, Nov. 2.—An order has gone into effect at the G. T. R. shops for the men to work 42 hours a week. This is the usual reduction of hours for the winter. Things are very busy at the shops and a force of 850 men is employed. There are 48 engines in at present for repairs.

NEW MONTREAL BOARD.

Montreal, Nov. 2.—Only one director's ticket was voted on at the annual meeting of the shareholders of the Montreal Street Railway Company, and that was the ticket proposed by the Canadian Power Syndicate. The new directors are Messrs. F. H. Wilcox, J. W. McConnell, Geo. C. Foster, K. C. D. Lorne McGibbon, W. C. Finley, J. M. Wilson and E. A. Robert. The meeting passed off without the slightest sign of discord though Mr. Robert Melhien, one of the retiring directors, voiced his objection to amalgamations in general and the proposed one with Canadian Power in particular.

PROFESSOR RELEASED.

Paris, Nov. 3.—A special dispatch from Madrid says that the military governor of Madrid has ordered the immediate release of Professor Ovejero, of the university, who was arrested recently as being identified with the anti-military campaign.

This action followed a decision rendered by a military judge before whom Ovejero came up for trial.

The judge declared that Ovejero had not attacked the discipline of the army, but the contrary had extolled the virtues of the army.

PRIZE APPLES.

Vancouver, B. C., Nov. 2.—The premier prize of \$1,000, at the first Canadian National Apple Show, was awarded to Kelowna, B. C., its car of Jonathans being pronounced by each of the judges to be the finest car of apples ever shown at any exhibition.

The apples were practically perfect, as out of a possible 1,000 the judges awarded 970 marks. "The best I have ever seen," declared Judge Prof. H. E. Vandeman, of Washington, D. C.

ENGLAND ORDERED OUT OF PERSIA

Germany Sends an Ultimatum About British Marines.

MUST LEAVE AT ONCE

Empire Has Had Its Eye Upon the Country For Many Years.

Berlin, Nov. 1.—According to semi-official information given out today, the foreign office has sent an ultimatum to England that the British Marines landed at Lingah, Persia, must be withdrawn at once.

Germany's Hold in Persia. Germany's earliest associations with Persia go back no further than 1873, when Prince Bismarck, taking advantage of the presence of Nazir-ed-Din in Europe, concluded a treaty of commerce with his Persian majesty, which is still in existence. Under the terms of this instrument it is stipulated that "In the event of Persia being involved in differences with another power the German Imperial Government declares itself ready to employ its good offices, at the invitation of the Shah's Government, with a view to promoting a settlement of such differences."

Beginning with the period about 1892-94, when Great Britain concluded a treaty with the Sultan of Muscat, first France, and then Russia, challenged our right to the special position which was claimed for British interests in the Persian gulf. In support of the light for a time, many work, a small army of consuls settled on the shores, when a fleet of strange craft began to appear on the waters of what was essentially a "mare Britannicum," though it was 1899 before a German cruiser, bent on a search for a terminus for the proposed Baghdad railway, visited Koweyt and Basra.

Lord Lansdowne's attitude was no business whatever with Persian ports, and whatever trade of German origin came down the north was that which percolated through Russian centres. By March, 1903, the Baghdad railway had descended to earth from the clouds of political discussion, though Germany's hold on Persia was still wholly non-existent. Two months later, in view of an agitation which was started in certain irresponsible quarters, an attempt was made to force the British to discontinue the famous warning that British interests in the Persian gulf would be defended by all the means at our disposal. The agitation died, and the conclusion of the treaty with France a year later further improved the situation.

While Great Britain and France were adjusting their differences, commercial reconnaissance of the immediate areas of the Persian gulf had been made by German agents. After prodigious exertions markets were found for German imports at the seven chief centres to a total value in 1905 of forty thousand pounds! Hitherto Germany had maintained a diplomatic representative at Teheran, who also attended to commercial affairs, and a consul at Bushire. In June, 1906, however, a regular monthly service of steamers belonging to the Hamburg-American line began to run to Basra, and a campaign started for Basra, and a campaign started for Basra, and a campaign started for Basra.

Policy Opposed to Allied Powers. Germany then elected to follow a policy directly opposed to the many treaties by which the vested interests of the allied powers were safeguarded. Not content with opening in the autumn of 1907 a German University in Teheran, where she had few nationals and no interests, German agents endeavored in 1908 to promote a scheme for the irrigation of the Ham Valley, which for thirty years had been the exclusive centre of the Anglo-Indian activity. Similarly, in spite of the clauses of the loan agreement of 1900, an agent of the Deutsche Orient Bank was established in Teheran, and while putting forward proposals for a loan was successful in causing a few weeks ago the rejection of the terms of the loan agreement.

Not content with this, the spirit of the railway agreement of 1890 and the provisions of the Anglo-Russian agreement of 1907 were equally ignored when a concession was made for the extension of the Baghdad Railway system across the headwaters of the Persian Gulf. Finally, German interests were granted permission from the Persian Government to establish regular navigation on Lake Urmia, though the monopoly of navigation on the lake, which is of strategic rather than commercial value to Russia, is one of the conditions of the Anglo-Russian loan.

SAW CRIPPEN

Miss Leneve Has Brief Interview in Prison With Him.

London, Nov. 2.—Ethel Leneve had an interview today with Dr. Crippen in the prison at Pentonville. She obtained the order in the usual way. The couple met in a private room in the presence of the warders. The interview was very short. It is understood that the disposal of the condemned man's property, the event of his appeal being unsuccessful, was decided.

Mr. Tobin denies the statement that he is returning his rifle. He says he will appear on behalf of Crippen when the appeal is argued.

ARRESTED AT TORONTO.

Toronto, Nov. 2.—At the request of the chief of police of Brantford, a young man, Bertram W. Kelly, was arrested on Yonge street this morning by Detective McKelvey. Kelly appeared in the police court, where he was remanded until tomorrow, when a constable from Brantford will be here to take him back to answer a charge of theft of money.

FIERCE RIOTS IN BIG CHICAGO STRIKE

One Officer Stabbed, 15 of Gang Injured and 25 Arrested.

FEAR MORE TROUBLE

Policemen Club Mob That Cleans Out Garment-Making Plant.

Chicago, Nov. 2.—Grim spectres of the days of the Haymarket riot haunted Chicago's streets for a brief time today, when Police Inspector S. K. Healy and 60 policemen, with drawn revolvers, charged several thousand striking garment workers who were rioting on the west side.

One policeman was stabbed, 15 rioters were seriously injured, and 25 strikers and sympathizers were arrested during the brisk fight which threatened to get beyond police control.

This is the most serious outbreak since the inception of the strike of garment workers. It occurred at the plant of A. Lott & Co., at West Ohio and Bickford streets. Before the police arrived, the strikers broke all the windows in the large building occupied by the clothing manufacturers, threw the clothing-makers out, carried a large number of sewing machines into the streets and destroyed them.

Police Swing Revolvers. The strikers and their followers put up a desperate fight. Before the police arrived, the strikers broke all the windows in the large building occupied by the clothing manufacturers, threw the clothing-makers out, carried a large number of sewing machines into the streets and destroyed them.

Strike pickets gained entrance to the Lott tailoring establishment as a mob of strikers approached the building. Some of the employees of the company joined the strikers and assisted in pulling machines from the floors and otherwise damaging the plant. Men and women were hurling stones and bricks through the windows of the factory when Healy and his squad of policemen arrived.

The inspector experienced difficulty in getting together the disorganized policemen who had borne the brunt of the early fighting. When he had done so, however, the policemen charged through the mob, knocking down all in their way. Many of the rioters fled when they saw the policemen draw revolvers. Others remained firm and hurled clubs and stones at the officers. A number of women were arrested, but most of these were released after they had been taken to a police station.

Steward Issues Orders. As a result of the day's developments in the strike situation, Chief of Police Steward Wednesday night ordered a conference of his inspectors, and issued a special set of emergency orders to officers in the various police districts where riots have occurred. The attitude of the police indicates that much more serious trouble is anticipated.

Strikers Wednesday night held a dozen largely attended meetings. The feeling of the strikers was intense at times, and agitators were active in urging the strikers to further disorder.

Meanwhile various club women, who have interested themselves in the cause of the girl garment workers, were urging their followers to refrain from any action which might injure their cause or their opportunity for procuring a favorable settlement of the strike.

SOVEREIGN ASSETS WILL BE AMPLE

Will Be Money Enough to Meet All Liabilities.

Toronto, Nov. 2.—As intimated at the annual meeting it is expected the liquidation of Sovereign Bank assets will furnish ample funds to pay off all liabilities. Leaving the shareholders free of any call, under the double liability on the bank's shares and possibly leaving something left over for distribution to the shareholders.

It is said liquidation is proceeding satisfactorily and the last report shows a nominal surplus of a considerable amount.

DR. HUTON DEAD

Pioneer Physician of St. Thomas Passes Away After Long Illness.

St. Thomas, Nov. 2.—Dr. Leonard Luton, one of the oldest medical practitioners in the city and county, and who has been prominently identified with educational, municipal and other affairs for the greater part of his life, passed away at his home last evening. The doctor had been in failing health for some time past.

Dr. Luton had lived in Elgin County all his life. He was born in Yarmouth on Feb. 5, 1835. He was a member of the city council for five years, was alderman, retiring in 1905. During that time he was chairman of the board of health for two years and president of the Amasa Wood Hospital board of governors. The deceased is survived by his widow, and two sons, Dr. Lionel S. Luton, of St. Louis, Mo., and Dr. Irwin L. Luton, Detroit, Mich.

WIFE-DESERTION.

Bellevue, Ont., Nov. 2.—Frederick Underhill, a middle-aged married man, was arrested here this morning on advice from Cobourg, charging him with wife-desertion. The accused had been working in the city for some time. He was taken back to Cobourg today.

GIRL BADLY HURT.

Stevensville, Ont., Nov. 2.—Miss Nellie Hazen lies unconscious at her home here, having been picked up beside the Michigan Central track near Welland four days ago. The girl, who had been visiting Buffalo, did not get off when the train reached Stevensville, but told the conductor she would go on to Welland. Nothing further has been learned of her movements before she was found beside the track the following morning. The girl has had lucid moments, but has been unable to tell what happened.

MEASLES OUTBREAK.

New York, Nov. 3.—The steamer Ultonia, which reached port today from Trieste, was detained at Quarantine where a number of cases of measles were discovered aboard. Fifty passengers, many of them mothers and children, were transferred to Hoffman Island for treatment and observation.

C. P. R. WILL PUT ON NEW STEAMERS

Four to Ply Between Nova Scotia and New York.

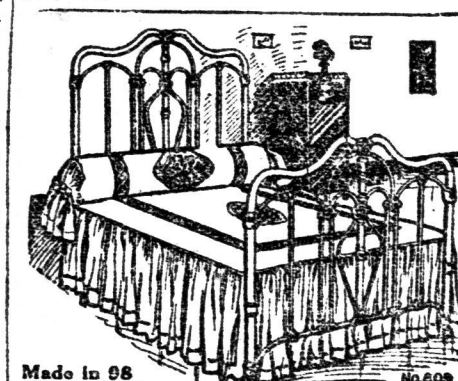
Montreal, Nov. 2.—Three million dollars is the amount that the C. P. R. will spend on improvements at the east end for connection with the Place Viger new passenger and freight terminals, and new freight sheds and warehouses. This announcement was made officially by the company.

It was also officially announced that the Canadian Pacific Railway Company has decided to build four new steamers for the coastwise steamship service between Nova Scotia ports and Boston and New York. These vessels will be larger, faster and stronger than any at present engaged in the North Atlantic coastwise traffic. This is one of the important developments that will follow the absorption of the Dominion Atlantic into the system in the spring.

The new vessels will be of the type of ocean liners, about 450 feet in length, with a carrying capacity of 5,000 tons, and able to make over twenty knots.

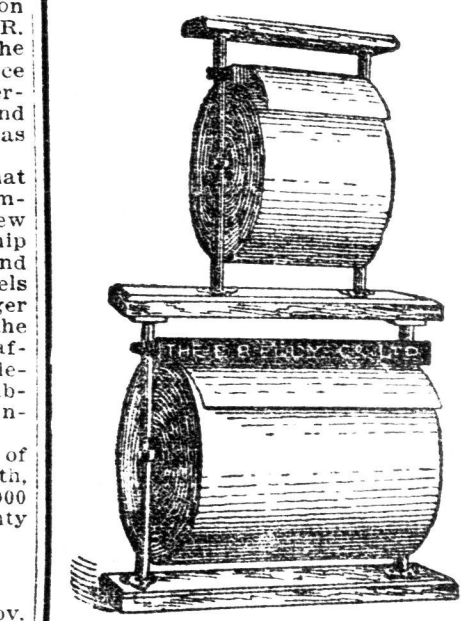

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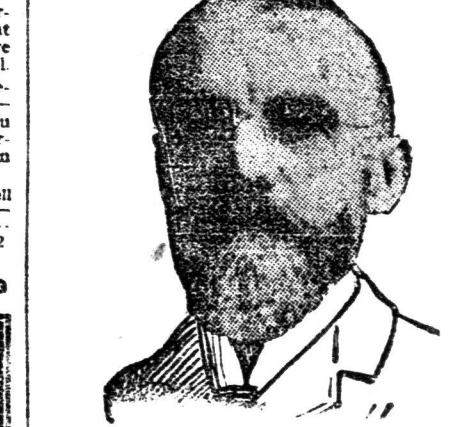
