The local improvement committee of the city council have not finished their work, although the council have decided to make the property owners pay the whole cost of walks, curbs, gutters and roads.

It is now the intention to outline a scheme for covering the city with pavements. A meeting will be called within a few days, probably as soon as the finance committee have the rate struck, and the whole problem will be gone into thoroughly.

"We have only commenced the work," said Ald. Richter. "It is the intention to have reports on the variations kinds of pavement in use at the present time. We will obtain all information as to cost, durability, saidability for certain kinds of work, in fact, everything pertaining to pavements will be secured.

"Then a report will be given us regarding the city, whether the various streets are of sand, or clay, or what care they are, and a recommendation as to the kind of pavement to be used in each district.
