ORANGEMEN FOREGATHER.

The Orangemen of Ontario West are gathering in the city for their annual meeting, under the presidency of an employee of the Whitney Government. Here and there a few Liberals may be humbugged into joining the order by the pretence that it is not a political organization, but it remains, as it has always been, the most militant wing of the Conservative party.

The Grand Lodge of Ontario West will discuss bilingual schools, the Ne Temere decree, and other politico-religious questions, but with the Conservative party in power at Ottawa and Toronto the debates will be robbed of their wonted fervor. Without a Liberal Government at hand to harry, the average Orangeman's occupation is gone. The home rule issue, in the circumstances, will be a special providence to the Grand Lodge. The brethren can dress up the Asquith Government in clerical robes and punch it to their hearts' content. The Black Knights have already finished the first round.

Some of our Roman Catholic fellow citizens take the Orange order too seriously. It is not so much anti-Catholic as anti-Liberal. In this country it dislikes Sir Wilfrid Laurier a greal deal more than it dislikes the In the last election it stood shoulder to shoulder with Bourassa and Lavergne, who represent the ultramontane element in the Province of Quebec. The Orange Sentinel and Le Devoir were the heavenly twins of the anti-Laurier press. White the Sentinel shrieked against him as a tool of French clerical aggrandisement, Le Devoir painted him in Orange colors. In this co-operative enterprise the Orangemen and Nationalists have been engaged for many years.




