LAY WATER EXTENSION ON LOCAL IMPROVEMENT PLAN IS MAYOR'S IDEA

Engineer To Report On North Dundas Street Proposal Soon As Possible.

Another phase of the disagreement between the city council and the utilities commission on the question of laying water mains on a frontage basis was aired at a meeting of the latter body yesterday. The discussion was precipitated by the request of a deputation asking for water service on Dundas street near the city limits.

His worship the mayor pointed out that the local improvements act gives to corporations the power to extend water mains as local improvements, to which the chairman, Philip Pocock, replied that no power was vested in the commission to do this. Turning to the members of the deputation then, he said the commission probably would put in the services asked for, charging the cost up to the users.

Mayor Stevenson argued that this was not fair. He pointed out that between the corporation and the commission was being asked, and the present limit of the main, were a number of vacant properties, and that, if the commission adopted the chairman's viewpoint, the owners of these when later they built on them, would be profiting at the expense of those who were paying now for the installation of the extension.

The chairman's contention in answer to this was that to lay mains on a frontage basis would be to levy a tax on the citizens, and that the commission was not authorized to do so. The mayor, however, maintained that a frontage tax for water mains was an equitable one, and not really a tax in the ordinary sense at all.

It was decided to leave the matter for the present pending a report from the engineer.

FORCE MAYOR'S HAND TO AFFIX SIGNATURE ON GLAUBITZ CHECK

Object of Bylaw Submitted By Utilities Chairman—Dr. Stevenson Objects.

In an obvious effort to force Mayor Stevenson's hand—an ineffectual effort, as his worship believes—Philip Pocock, chairman of the utilities commission, at a meeting of that body yesterday, submitted a bylaw drawn up at his request by the city solicitor, empowering the chairman and treasurer to sign, and the mayor to countersign, all checks authorized for payment by the commission. In the event of the absence from the city of mayor or chairman, the bylaw provides that a member of the commission respectively may sign as proxy.

Mr. Pocock declared that the bylaw would be a legal one, and that he was not, as he claimed, illegally signing checks for the commission. He said no bylaw ever had been passed specifying who should sign checks, and that the city solicitor, when this was pointed out to him, expressed surprise that the bank had honored the commission's checks at all.

LONDON GIRL MAY BE SISTER OF MAN FOUND IN RIVER

Story in Advertiser Starts Investigation—Body Found at Sarnia.

Believing the body found floating at the mouth of the Black River at Sarnia, on Monday to be the remains of his brother, Robert, missing since January, Walter Davis, of Mt. Elgin, will immediately get into communication with Sarnia authorities in an endeavor to clear up the mystery surrounding the dead man's identity.

Mr. Davis first saw the story of the finding of the body in The Morning Advertiser, under a Sarnia date line. Since the strange disappearance of Robert, who was only eighteen years of age, he and a sister, employed as a switchboard operator at the asylum for insane here, have harbored great fears that their brother had in some unknown manner met his death.

On January 25 Robert Davis left his brother's home in Mt. Elgin, stating that he was coming to this city to enlist with the overseas force. After he boarded the train, every trace of him has been lost.

Sister Expected Him Here.
To an Advertiser reporter last night, Mr. Davis declared that when her brother had written from Mt. Elgin stating that Robert was on his way to London, she had daily expected him, but he had not shown up.

Becoming alarmed, she had made inquiries at the concentration camp at Queen's Park. Among the near three thousand recruits enlisted there, there was no trooper who answered the description she gave of the younger brother. The roll of each company was searched but the missing boy was not located.

Will Start Investigation.
Over the long distance telephone last night, Mr. Davis inquired of the body taken from the river was the remains of his brother, and that he intended to take steps towards an investigation at once.

Miss Davis stated last night that her missing brother had only been in this country several days previous to his disappearance, coming here from England.

SANATORIUM AID SOCIETY APPOINTS SECOND NURSE

Will Assist in Visiting Tubercular Ill in City.

At a meeting of the Women's Sanatorium Aid Society held yesterday at the home of Mrs. Donald McLean, 1000 Eglinton street, it was decided to appoint a second nurse to assist Miss Hanson in her work of aiding and visiting the tubercular poor. In the past few months a very large amount of milk and nourishing food has been dispensed.

An illustration of the nature of cases which are not infrequently met with was reported at yesterday's meeting. In one home the nurse found little food, and a new-born babe without any wrapping, and in another case a mother was found to be in a state of collapse.

The case at once reported to the relief committee, and instructions given to purchase coal and blankets. In order that the child might be clothed as quickly as possible, Miss Hanson and her assistant nurse, who had not then been formally appointed by the society, set up most of one night sewing upon the garments.

The society asks that in London homes, all newspapers, cardboard boxes, old rubbers, and examination and school papers used by children, be saved and donated for its benefit. For some time now the organization has not appended to the public in any other way, but if citizens would comply with this request, a steady income would be insured. By telephoning 1497, a rig will call for packages of articles indicated above.

Pass Uncomplimentary Remarks About Kaiser.

"A short while ago tonight our men exchanged greetings with the enemy by calling across the intervening 200 yards," writes Corp. L. D. Anderson. "One would not care to mention several of the remarks passed concerning the Kaiser. They were not all directed and some of the German trench was equally indiscreet in his remarks concerning our crowned head. These opening remarks were followed by 'Tippecary,' 'Rudy Brelan,' and the 'Maple Leaf.' The Germans clapped and laughed at our efforts, and responded with the 'Watch on the Rhine' and 'Beloved, It Is Morning.' The closing feature of this entertainment was an offer by our men of bully beef in exchange for German sausages.

"One of my section was sniping, and I saw some German fellow waive a spade from side to side, signalling a miss. We returned the compliment a minute later."

Corp. Anderson says that the Germans evidently fear the advance that the Allies are preparing to make, and are busy strung thousands of yards of barbed wire. They sometimes ring a dummy up and taunt the Canadians at their shooting. The artillery keeps up a steady rain of shells on both sides."
