

> [Canadian Press.] London, Oct. 30 .- A "long distance submarine blockade" of England in waters far from Europe, such as the U-53 carried out for

short time, is sure to be undertaken on a large scale, writes D. Thomas Curtin of Boston, in the Times today. The Deutschland's visit to Baltimore was to take soundings for this blockade. The mob is carefully deprived of news of the loss of submarines, and cannot unlerstand why you are not starved already. The leaders who know be-lieve in the long distance plan. beaten and punished for her crimes call 'hold, enough! Let us make an honorable peace and get what we can, not go down in history as bar-Ruthless von Tirpitz.

'Von Tirpitz nominally leads the ruthless section, backed by Count Zeppelin. The kaiser is cunningly pushing the matter forward. Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg, who paradoxically is also the kaiser's supporter, leads the other party. "It notorious that the German royal family is auxious for its personal safety. 'Even in case of a whisper, 'since the Deutschland ex-

periment the kaiser and his family could escape safely in the event Germany was invaded.' "The voyage of the Deutschland to the United States was a practical engineering test in preparation for a campaign of submarine frightfulness against allied and neutral shipping in the safe waters of the far Atlantic and elsewhere as soon as enough submarines were ready. do not imagine that the Germans have any compunction about drownwomen and children. The greater part of Germany cordially indorsed the issue of the Lusitania medal struck to commemorate Ger-man defiance of Great Britain and

the United States. "The Germans think that if the Allies cannot be fought to peace by the army and navy, they will be frightened into it by long dis-tance submarining. Submarining close to England has long ceased, but the National Liberals, the Tirpitzites, believe you are unable tackle long distance submarines in the Atlantic."

Many Citizens of States Aboard-Part of Crew Picked Up But Many Still Unaccounted For-U. S. Govt. Official Starts Investigation at Oueenstown,

Newport News, Va., Oct. 30 .- There were fifty Americans on the British steamship Marina, reported torpedoed without warning in today's dispatches from London, when she sailed from Newport News. The Americans were signed here as horsemen. They were all white, and gave their homes as in various sections of the United States.

Local agents for the owners of the Marina say cable advices reported the vessel leaving Glasgow for Newport News October 25 in ballast.

Consul Frost at Queenstown specified that the information he transmitted was "provisional." Investigation will be made at once to determine the status of the Marina and the nature of the attack, to determine whether any of Germany's pledges to the United States have been violated.
