Wouldn't Hesitate For a Minute To Take Dip On Sunday, Says Rev. Warner

People Go Swimming in Front of Their Cottages and Nothing Thought Of It. But When Those Who Disport Themselves in Rented Suits Take a Swim, Someone Thinks It Is All Wrong—Lot of Worse Things a Person Could Do, Declares Rev. G. M. Young.

"Cleanliness is next to godliness," quoth the masters of old, and the same has descended down triumphant through the ages, even until such time as the latest copybook was presented for the public schools.

"But do you think that the real reason why they are swimming at Port Stanley?" questions Rev. A. C. Bingham, Esq., of the Esplanade Baptist Church, discussing the proposed investigation of Sunday behavior at the lakeside. "If they actually go in to become cleaner, go on, I don't care," continued Mr. Bingham. "However, personally I would rather not say anything against a man who is swimming on Sunday, because I don't think it is a bad thing. I really would not hesitate for a minute to take a dip on Sunday."

"Of course, I don't see the slightest conception of conditions at Port Stanley, and I realize that naturally a laxity of conduct could lead to abuse. However, I have yet to go there this summer, and I would not care to voice an opinion. From what little I have heard, however, I feel that the people who go to the lakeside are not there to become cleaner, but to get a double standard. Most people who go to a summer home, whether it be a cottage or a hotel, do not hesitate to go in swimming in their own premises, and nobody thinks anything of it, but when the great mass of the people who must rent a bathing suit and go to the lakeside, and the same public, somebody is quick to declare it is all wrong. Where the real difference remains to be seen. It will surely be making a very fine distinction."

OPPORTUNITY TO REFLECT ON REFUGEE CARLS NOW ASSURED

Agreement Reached Between Railway Commission and Quebec Province.

Ottawa, June 21.—Until July 15th, when the importation of liquors must cease in Ontario an opportunity will be given for the replenishing of the stores as a result of a ruling given in the railway commission today. The ruling was reached by common consent of Quebec, represented here by the Hon. J. G. Macdonald, and the province of Ontario, represented by the Hon. J. G. Macdonald.

The Quebec Government sought to control both the importation and exportation of liquors, but the justice department has already given a ruling to the effect that in Scott act areas any individual may import as he sees fit. The express companies, however, have declined to handle export business without the consent of the railway commission. Such consent has been given today. In the meantime steps are being taken to bring about the repeal of the Scott act in Quebec City, which has created an anomalous situation viewed from the standpoint of complete government control.

OBJECTION RAISED BY BOLSHIEVICS TO AID FOR RUSSIAN REFUGEES

Riga, June 21.—M. T. T. Bolshiev, minister of the interior, has sent out a wireless message to the British foreign secretary stating that the British offer of aid to Russian refugees is objectionable to the Russian Government. The message says that the Russian Government considers this aid would be direct support of the Russian counter-revolutionaries and contradictory to the spirit of the British-Russian treaty. The dispatch adds that Tchitcherine presumes to participate in what he declares to be an unfriendly action toward Russia.

"MERRY G" WINNER

Special Committee Will Meet Thursday Morning.

HEADS OF DEPARTMENTS

Will Be Present With List of Older Members of Staffs.

BRITISH INDUSTRIAL SITUATION REMAINS CHAOTIC AS EVER

Some Mines Reopened, But Resumption of Work Not General.

LONDON, June 21.—By Canadian Associated Press.—Although some of the collieries have reopened and a considerable number of miners have reported for work, there has been no general drift back to the mines.

The industrial situation continues as chaotic as ever, awaiting the test of the miners' call for a general strike of unions threatened with wage reductions. Some of the miners' leaders, however, are said to be casting about for other openings for peace talks, but no definite move has been disclosed as yet.

At the same time the delegates who have gone back to their districts are urging the men not to break away from the federation, and to defer action until the result of the government's appeal to the other unions. The endeavors in this direction have been successful to some extent, for district reports show that large numbers of miners who were expected to return to work yesterday were present at the collieries.

VISITING OUTPOSTS OF THE DOMINION

Two R. C. M. P.'s and Medical Man Go To Hudson's Bay.

Ottawa, June 21.—(By Canadian Press).—Inspector J. W. Phillips and Corp. Rimmer of the R. C. M. P., accompanied by a medical officer, left yesterday morning for a three-months' trip to Hudson's Bay.

The party will investigate and report upon the health and general conditions of the natives, principally Indians and Eskimos, among whom a certain amount of destitution has been reported lately. They will visit the Belcher Islands, and will make a number of calls along the coast as far north as the Mealy Mountains.

The party will be accompanied by a large boat, which will be chartered for the purpose. Inspector Phillips visited the Belcher Islands last year in connection with the Eskimo murder case, which occurred there in 1919.

Sulgrave, Northamptonshire, June 21.—Sulgrave Manor, ancestral home of the Washingtons, was rededicated today with elaborate ceremonies after its restoration, at a cost of \$50,000, to the state in which it existed three centuries ago.

In addition to dignitaries from London, the Lord Mayor of Birmingham, Northampton and Banbury, and other towns, were present, attired in their gorgeous robes of office, wearing the official chains and preceded by the bearers of the maces, symbolical of civil authority. Members of town corporations from various centres also attended.

The Marquis of Cambridge, brother of Queen Mary, gave the principal address. The Prince of Wales planned to be present, but was detained. He extended an invitation, however, to a delegation to call on him tomorrow at St. James' Palace, London, to give him an opportunity to express his personal interest in the enterprise at Sulgrave.

NON-POLITICAL GOVERNMENT

Vienna, June 21.—Herr Schober, police president of Vienna, has been requested to form a new ministry by the Christian Socialist party, which voted unanimously in favor of extending the invitation to him. It is understood he has stipulated he must have a free hand in the selection of his ministry, and that this has been agreed to. He is expected to form a purely non-political government.

GRATTON ESMONDE TALKS OF FIGHT FOR FAITH AND LIBERTY

Forsees the French-Canadians and Canadian-Irish Comrades in Arms.

LAUDS MEIGHEN

Mayor of Montreal Attends Meeting of Irish Self-Determination League.

Montreal, June 21.—Addressing a crowded audience at the Monument National here last night, under the auspices of the Self-Determination League of Canada, Gratton Esmonde, described on the program as "special envoy of the Irish republic of Australia," said, speaking first in French, that he regarded the presence of the mayor of Montreal and the speeches of French-Canadians in defence of Irish freedom, as proof that the people of Montreal and Quebec province were heartily in sympathy with Ireland, and he hoped that henceforth Canada and Canada-Irish would fight together for faith and liberty.

Following in English, Mr. Esmonde claimed that the press in the British dominions was 100 per cent more hostile to Ireland than the press in England. He referred to "the joke of the day" in London, that the people of Ireland were "not fit to be ruled by a man of color," and said that "Lloyd George is a man of color."

EMBARK AT HOLYHEAD

Elaborate Precautions Being Taken by Authorities in Belfast.

LONDON, June 21.—King George and Queen Mary were given a remarkable send off at the railway station here today when they departed for Holyhead on the way to Belfast to participate in the state opening of the Ulster Parliament.

A great crowd which had gathered repeatedly cheered the King and Queen and sang the National Anthem. At intervals in the cheering there were many shouts of "Good Luck, and a safe return to your majesties." The station was gaily decorated. The King and Queen will embark at Holyhead on the royal yacht early tomorrow and proceed to Belfast.

KING AND QUEEN LEAVE LONDON FOR BELFAST

LONDON, June 21.—King George and Queen Mary prepared this morning to leave for a port on the Irish Sea, where they will tonight, go on board a steamer which will take them to Belfast, in which city they will preside tomorrow at the state opening of the Parliament of Northern Ireland.

The royal steamer will be escorted by two light cruisers and ten destroyers on its trip across the Irish Sea. Elaborate precautions are being taken by the police and crown forces in Belfast to insure the safety of the King and Queen while they are in that city.

BURLINGTON BOY ACCIDENTALLY SHOT

W. E. Buzza Fatally Wounded While Cleaning His Boots.

LOCAL RAIL EMPLOYEES DO NOT CONSIDER 12 PER CENT CUT IN WAGES AS FAIR

Have Already Expressed Disapproval of Reduction by General Vote—Proposal Will Be Rejected—Another Vote On Question More Than Likely.

Local rail employees generally expressed an opinion relative to the recent 12 per cent reduction in wages, similar to that of General Organizer W. J. McPherson, who asserted that the dispatch emanating from Montreal that the wages of railroad workers averaged at \$1,700, was "hardly fair." That the same rate as applied to the American brotherhoods should not be applied to those on the Canadian side, is the general feeling of the railmen.

"The most of living has certainly been greatly reduced on the American side," commented J. Chick, secretary of the Brotherhood of Railway Clerks, today, "and locally I know that the members of our organization do not consider the 12 per cent reduction fair. Mr. Chick stated that as yet, as far as he was aware, the management had not sent out any call for representatives of the clerical staffs to enter into consultation. Local representatives of the B. of R. C. and the O. R. 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U.S. NAVY SEAPLANE BOMBER FALLS INTO SEA AND EXPLODES

Wreckage Caught Fire—Crew Reported "All Saved. None Injured."

Washington, June 21.—Naval seaplane N. C. 7 was wrecked and burned after a forced landing in Hampton Roads, Va., but all members of the crew were rescued and uninjured, according to a telephone report to the navy department. The report said a bomb carrier, the aircraft was not a bomber, but a seaplane.

First reports failed to show the cause of the landing or the fire, naval officials at Hampton Roads state. Newport News, Va., June 21.—A navy seaplane bomber outward bound for the bombing tests at sea, fell in Hampton Roads today and apparently exploded some of the bombs the ship carried. A navy tug rushed to its aid.

The force of the explosion when the ship sank threw water high in the air and rattled windows ashore. The tug was seen to pick up something, but witnesses ashore could not see the cause of the explosion. The crew of the plane had escaped.

MR. SPEAKER RHODES EXPECTED TO RESIGN

Ottawa, June 21.—In the event of Mr. Speaker Rhodes accepting the position of president and general manager of the British-American Biographical and Historical Society, it is generally believed here that he will resign his position as speaker of the House of Commons. It is well known, however, that Mr. Rhodes is not communicative on the subject, though he admits that the offer has been made and intimates that he will accept.

ANTI-BOLSHIEVİK FORCES COMPLETELY DEFEATED

London, June 21.—Anti-Bolshievik forces commanded by Gen. Baron von Ungern-Sternberg, which were invading Southern Siberia, have been completely defeated by the army of the Far Eastern Republic, says a dispatch received here from Chita. It says the robber bands were virtually annihilated, and that the survivors have fled into Mongolia.

DEMobilize 1919 CLASS

Paris, June 21.—The cabinet today authorized the war minister to begin demobilization of the entire class of 1919 on June 25. The decision to demobilize this class was reached upon receipt of a report that the classes of 1920 and 1921 had been trained adequately.
