# FINANCE BOARD

Mayor Urges All Public Utility Enterprises Should Be Taxed.

RECOMMEND ACTION

Tranquility personified was yesterday's session of the finance board of the city council with Ald. W. A. Wilson presiding. It was, perhaps, the quietest gathering on record at the city hall this season, but as Ald. Wilson remarked pleasantly: "Gordon Drake says that I was the best chairman they ever had in the board of works"

Mayor Wenige thinks that all public utility enterprises should be taxed as private corporations, and a recommendation to that effect goes to Monday night's council session for further consideration.

Ald. Greer submitted that this form of taxation was nothing more or less than a question of bookkeeping. He was not opposed to having the matter finally disposed of by the council as a whole. Ald. George Burdick questioned if it was fair competition for other electrical dealers to let the public utilities free from a business as-

No Further Action.

No action was taken to further the Oxford street paving project, Mayor Wenige agreeing that the recent passage of the bylaw had been illegal. Ald. Wilson predicted that the issue could not be reconsidered without a two-thirds vote of the council? Ald. Burdick seemed reconciled to the inevitable. "We can bring it up again next year," he said hopefully. The finance committee directed No action was taken to further the The finance committee directed City Treasurer James Bell to submit his 1924 estimates by Nov. 1 as a guide for next year's council.

do this work.
"What's the delay?" was the question, and the mayor answered: "The thing is in such a mess that they haven't got the ends unravelled yet All I hear from these people progress."

"What's the trouble?" inquired Ald. Burdick. "It's up to us to see that this work is done. It is getting on to the end of the year. This delay is no good. We want no fooling. If there is anything wrong let them tell us." "The chief trouble is that they do not finish," explained the mayor.

gested that they move an amend-ment to the British North America Act if they proposed to tax every-body and everything.

Questions Salary. Ald. Wilson inquired casually dur-Edwin Smith was going to receive \$1,500 for his services as secretary of the Old Boys' Association. "Nothing doing. All jobs were honorary withremuneration," responded the mayor, while Ald. Burdick ventured the remark that Mr. Smith would probably have been paid if the finances were available. It was finally called to the attention of the chairman' that they were discussing a question which fell under the jurisdiction of the Old Boys' Association. Three grants were authorized: One hundred dollars for the Humane Society; \$100 for the London Poultry Association, and \$200 for the Women's Institute, who stage an annual convention here Nov. 6, 7, 8, at which are expected 500 delegates. Ald. Wilson and other members took occasion incidentally to voice commendation of the work being accomplished by Humane Inspector George Tustin.

#### Place Occupied By Nuts In Well-Rounded Dietary

HOW TO USE THEM WISELY. There is no need to urge the cul-ivation of a taste for nuts, for they re almost universally popular. Rather s it in order to suggest that any one interested in dietetics inform himself as to the food value of nuts, as to whether they are "indigestible" as many suppose them to be and also as to their place in a carefully planned

lietary.
First, as to the food value. Using the popular English walnut as an illustration, we find that this delicious nut contains 16.7 per cent protein or body building material, 64.4 per cent fats, 14.8 per cent carbohydrate or heat and flesh forming material, 1.32 per cent of the valuable mineral salts and 3,305 calories of energy to he pound. Other varieties of nuts vary upward and downward in these but the above will give a good asis for comparison.

When we reflect that a pound of English walnut meat gives as much actual all-round food value as four pounds of lean beef or 13 pounds of oysters we have a fair idea of the theoretical value of nuts. Now, as to the digestibility of nuts.

Authorities differ here as in most other matters, Suppose we strike a safe mean between the extreme views nuts to little children; that when we give them to children of the school age they shall be finely ground, and then only as a part of a carefully planned menu, and not as a dessert after a meal already adequate.

This brings us to the third point, i.e., the place of nuts in the wellounded dietary.

King. Melt two tablespoons of butter in a sauce pan; add a tablespoon of chopped onion, and cook in the but-ter. Then stir in six fresh mushrooms which have been chopped; add one tablespoon of chopped pimentoes and a cup of cream. Boil fifteen minutes. Add the yolk of two eggs, stirring constantly. When the mixture begins to thicken add three cups nuts are best reserved, for at least the school age.
