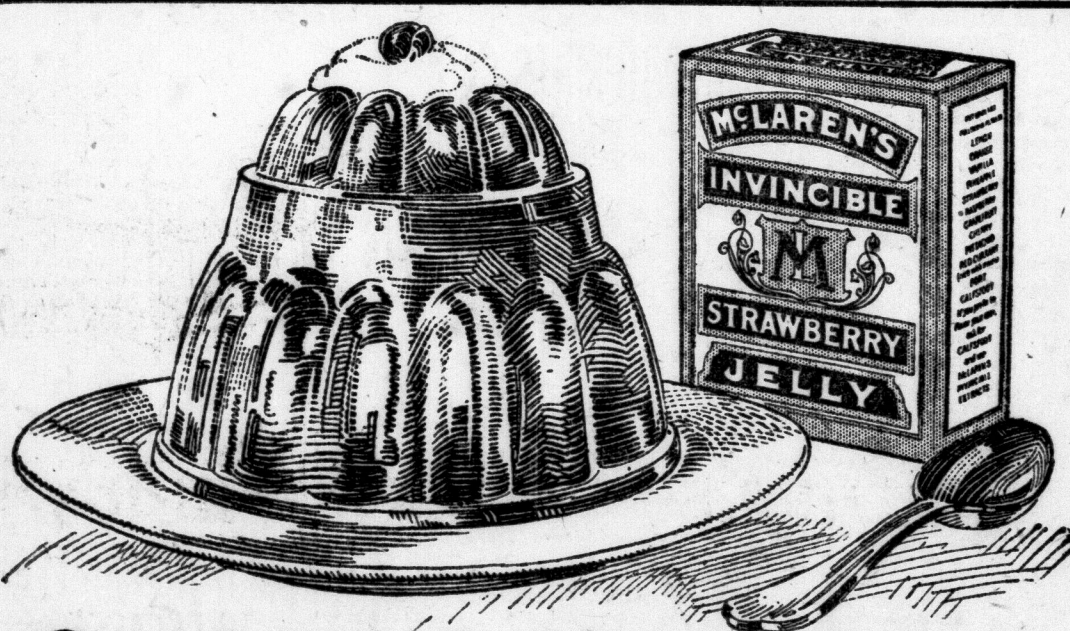

## LEWIS POINTS DEFECTS IN THE ALLOWANCE ACT

Toronto Conservative Member  
Declares Many Women Not  
Receiving Consideration.

### BOWMAN REPORTS

Minister Declares New Road  
Will Be Built From North  
Bay To Pembroke.

Toronto, March 9.—Characterizing the government's power settlement at the head of the Great Lakes as an improvident move, D. M. Hogarth, Conservative member for Port Arthur in the Legislature, yesterday declared that in its consideration of the intricate question of Nipigon power the Gregory commission had been animated by a desire to pull government political chestnuts out of the fire.

Besides Mr. Hogarth, Messrs. Sandy, Lewis, Bowman and Mageau spoke, the last-mentioned moving the adjournment of the debate until Tuesday next.

At the evening session, Alex. Lewis (Conservative, Toronto) criticized the workings of the mothers' allowance act, pointing out that as at present women are by no means a woman with \$700 cash from becoming a beneficiary. He illustrated his case against the act with the recital of facts concerning a woman with two children, who had been left \$1,000 life insurance. The only method by which she could benefit for herself and children was by spending some of her money, or, as she was advised by the chairman of the board, to invest a portion of her money in a house.

When Mr. Lewis also expressed a desire to see widows with one child become beneficiaries, he was asked by K. H. Honneth, Labor member for Waterloo, if he would support a bill to that end. Mr. Lewis said he would, but that he could not speak for the Conservative group.

Bowman Gives Report.  
Proceeding, the member for North-east Toronto said that the University of Toronto should be strictly under provincial control and financed wholly out of provincial finances.

Hon. Beniah Bowman, Minister of lands and forests, gave a brief survey of Northern Ontario conditions. Touching on the Northern Ontario roads problem, Hon. Mr. Bowman announced amidst some applause that there would be an improved trunk road next year from North Bay to Pembroke. The department was also endeavoring to connect up Cochrane with Cobalt, and in a few years' time Hearst would be connected up with Cochrane.

Mr. Bowman outlined the activities of his department in connection with the protection of forests from fire. Each year Ontario's fire rangers, he said, patrolled an area of some 100,000,000 acres.

Z. Mageau (Liberal, Sturgeon Falls) urged upon the government the desirability of taking steps to see that established pulp and paper companies with large amounts of capital invested should secure adequate reserves of timber. If necessary, he felt that the government should waive sale by tender in order to achieve this object.

W. H. Casselman, Dundas, who sits on the government side, had another encounter with Premier Drury. He attacked the premier for his remarks to a deputation the day before concerning a bill introduced to give the adolescent school attendance act a five-year hiatus.

Mind Is Unchanged.  
The premier told the deputation that the bill would be sent to one of the lethal chambers provided in Legislature procedure for the killing of such bills. "I thought this chamber was a forum for the discussion of public questions," said Mr. Casselman. "I think that out of common decency the premier might have had the grace to have waited until he heard my argument before he made such a statement regarding the bill. He apparently does not know that there is a great weight of public opinion behind my bill."

The prime minister declared that he had stated his position openly and had not changed his mind. There was no demand for such legislation and he thought he was in close touch with rural and urban opinion. He told Mr. Casselman that he should cultivate a sense of humor. His words about the bill, he said, were a prophecy.

Joe E. Thompson (Conservative, Northeast Toronto) wanted to know if Arthur Roebuck was a government employee, and if so what right he had to engage in politics. The premier said Mr. Roebuck was not a civil employee, but had been engaged by the government on occasions as legal counsel, and there was nothing to prevent him engaging in politics if he so desired.

Scores Business Methods.  
D. M. Hogarth (Conservative, Port Arthur) continued the debate on the budget, saying that the Nipigon power trouble was more of a quarrel between Premier Drury and Sir Adam Beck than a quarrel between Port William and Port Arthur. "If the premier can't agree with Sir Adam, then the logical thing for him to do is to dismiss him," said Mr. Hogarth.

The government, however, chose to create an atmosphere of uncertainty in hydro affairs. In the treatment of the Nipigon the government had broken the first principle upon which the hydro system was based. Mr. Hogarth announced that he was through with politics, and said that this session was his swan song.

F. G. Sandy (U.F.O., South Victoria) declared that constant criticism of the attorney-general was injurious to the proper enforcement of the O. T. A. He spoke of the necessity of improved agricultural conditions, and ventured that the prediction the next parliament with a farmers' government still in power would take the necessary steps to remedy the wrongs in the farming world. Alex. Lewis (Conservative, Northeast Toronto) attacked the government for its conduct of business in the House. He said it was not prepared, and that business lagged, and the House was held up as a result.

## SAYS RUSSIA IS PAST STAGE OF STARVATION

Herbert Hoover Declares Relief For Soviet Children Will Continue.

New York, March 9.—Starvation stalks no more in Russia, Secretary of Commerce Herbert Hoover declares.

In a statement Thursday Hoover said the American relief administration will continue its present feeding of Soviet children, and the Moscow government has pledged to care for its adults. This assistance will be sufficient to prevent hunger at least until the fall harvests.

So far the A. R. A. has given food and clothing to 15,000,000 Russians.

It will provide for 3,000,000 additional children before fall, Hoover said.

Hoover's statement was significant in view of reports that American aid was to be withdrawn from Russia.

## NORTH EASTHOPE HOME IS DESTROYED BY FIRE

The loss is estimated at between five and six thousand dollars.
