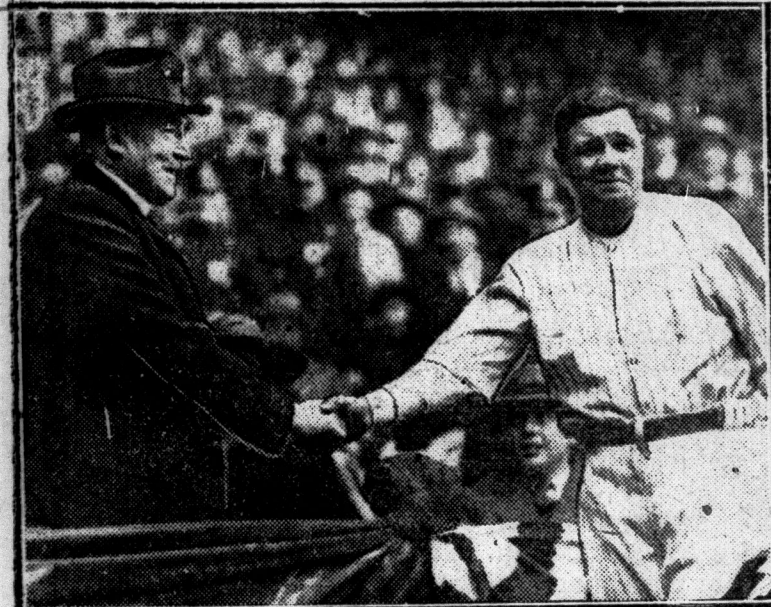

H. Godfroy Langlois and his daughter on their way to Paris. M. Langlois is to act as commissioner-general for the province of Quebec in Belgium.

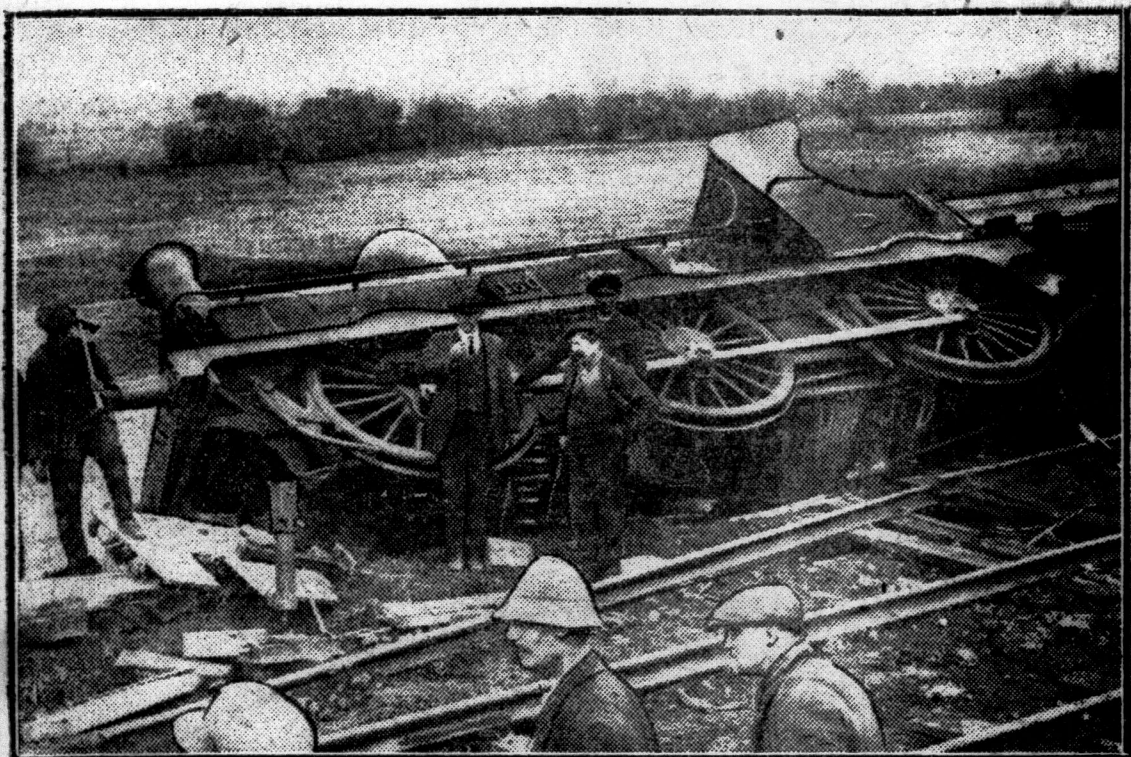
