J. H. Geldhart, Y.M.C.A. Secretary in China, Tells of Troubled Conditions.

ERA OF WAR LORDS

Following thirteen years spent in China as secretary of the Y. M. C. A. in the Orient, J. H. Geldhart has returned to Canada in the interests of the foreign work of the Y. M. C. A. During the last few days he has given lectures before the members of the "Y." on the work in China. in an interview with an Advertiser representative last night, Mr. Geldhart gave an analysis of the present conflict being waged by the factions in China.

Mr. Geldhart, who is a Canadian, a graduate of Acadia University, has travelled widely in China, having touched twelve of the eighteen provinces during the last year. The stage for the present conflict was all set and ready months before the fighting began, and is merely one stage in the working out of political free-dom in this age-old nation, he said. In discussing the civil war situation. Mr. Geldhart told the following interesting story:

Commerce Increases.

"In the winter of 1911-12, the Chinese people in a popular uprising became a republic, and since then there has been unrest and at times civil war. The presidents have been weak, and little progress has been made in government, though in other lines great strides have been made. China now has 7,000,000 students in all her schools and when she has Canada's percentage she must provide schools for over 100,000,000. Her commerce has increased every year for the last twenty years, notwithstanding the unrest at home and the world war. Shanghai and Hongkong are now second and third largest norts in the world, next to New York.
