GALLIOWS TO END CHAPMAN CAREER

Spectacular Bandit To Be
Hanged June 25 For
Murder.

Hartford, Conn., April 4.—Gerald
Chapman, spectacular mail bandit,
jail breaker and criminal extraordinary,
today was sentenced to hang in
the Connecticut state prison June 25
in payment for the life of a New
Britain patrolman, of whose murder
last October 12 a jury had convicted
him less than an hour before.
The verdict means death on the
gallows for the colorful bandit, the
man who had the police of a dozen
countries searching for him when
the state of Connecticut sought him
on the murder charge which ended
in his conviction.

dealer.

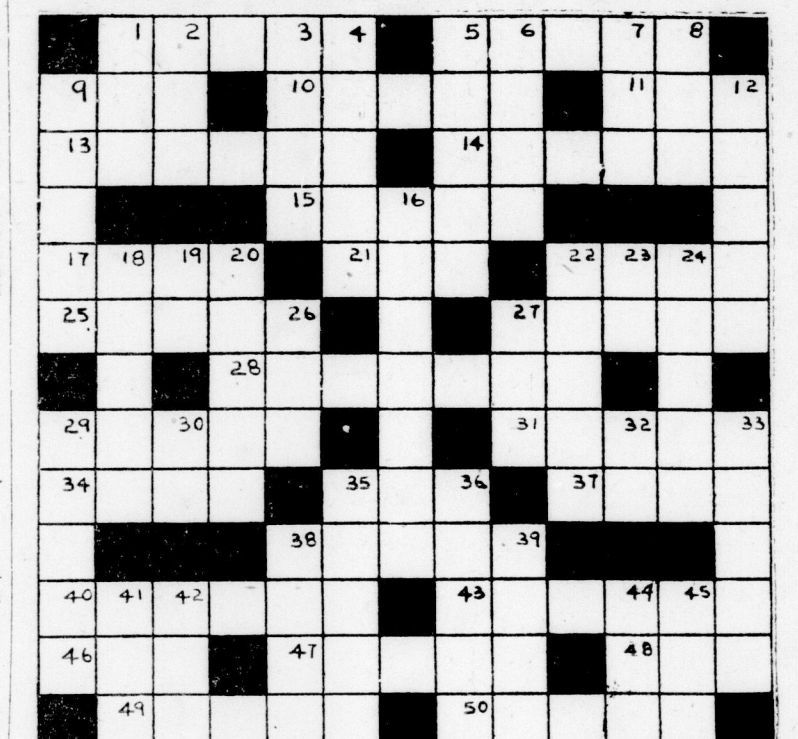
Pound-Net Use Growing At Port

LEAMINGTON GIRL HED FOR MURDER

Edna Brown Remanded To Jail
For Week Following Pre-
liminary Hearing.

Ridgeway, April 5.—Edna Brown
of Leamington is held on a charge of
murder, following the finding of the
body of her year-old babe in a cul-
vert not far from here. It is alleged
that she strangled the infant and then
hid the body in the culvert, where it
was found after she had been closely
cross-examined by police officials in-
vestigating her story that an un-
known motorist had caused the death
of the child. Preliminary hearing
was held in Chatham on Saturday
and she was remanded to jail for a
week.

The remains of the infant were in-
terred in Greenwood cemetery on
Saturday, and the mother is in Kent
county jail in Chatham.

Coroner Dr. D. Marr has opened an
inquest, which has been adjourned
until Wednesday afternoon next in
the town hall here. Members of the
coroner's jury are: J. R. Serson,
William Rhody, W. Harrison, W.
Cudmore, J. T. Smith, Edward Smith,
William Miller, Hugh Hayes, W. A.
Walters, W. J. Campbell, J. H. Wil-
son and A. Early.

Blames Stranger.

On Friday last, the girl arrived at
the home of Mrs. Humble, where she
told a story of having been given a
ride by an unknown motorist in a
coupe. She said that this motorist
had strangled the child, and then cut
his throat. Mrs. Humble sent the girl
to see Chief Tye, who, when he heard
the story, sent for Provincial Officer
Lowe at Chatham. The girl was sub-
jected to a severe grilling, under
which she is said to have admitted
that her story was not correct, and
that she was responsible for the death
of the child. She was im-
mediately taken into custody and
then directed the officers to the hid-
ing place of the body.

Walter Brown and family came
here from New York state some years
ago, and recently moved to the
Leamington district. It is alleged
that the girl was told by her mother
that she could not remain at home
with the babe, and that the girl came
to Ridgeway on Wednesday last
and went to the home of Mrs. William
Finch of the Thameville side road,
about three miles from town. From
this place she walked down the 10th
concession, and finally back into
Ridgeway. It is alleged that she
carried the body of the babe in a
suitcase for four miles before she
hid it.

There are reports to the effect that
the girl was married while she was
living here. The girl is still known

DECISION IS REACHED TO PAVE WESTWARD INTO TILLSONBURG

Tillsonburg, April 5.—The council
chamber was filled to capacity with
local ratepayers and representatives
of district municipalities to greet S.
L. Squire, deputy minister of high-
ways, and hear his contention in re-
gard to the western entrance of the
southern highway into town. Mayor
Hollister occupied the chair, and ex-
plained the meeting was the result of
a local delegation to Toronto a few
weeks ago.

Mr. Squire gave a brief outline of
several proposed surveys, and then
asked for the opinion of the meeting.
The matter had simmered down to
two proposed routes out of seven
surveyed, namely, the John Pound

road and Baldwin street. Several
ratepayers and councillors gave their
views, as did several outside repre-
sentatives, and they were all unani-
mous for the John Pound road. The
estimated cost for Baldwin street
was \$65,000, and the other route \$45-
000, and complying with the general
opinion of the meeting, Mr. Squire
promised their wishes would be con-
veyed to Hon. G. S. Henry, and ten-
ders were now being advertised
for 1½ miles of concrete road,
connecting the eastern entrance into
the town.
