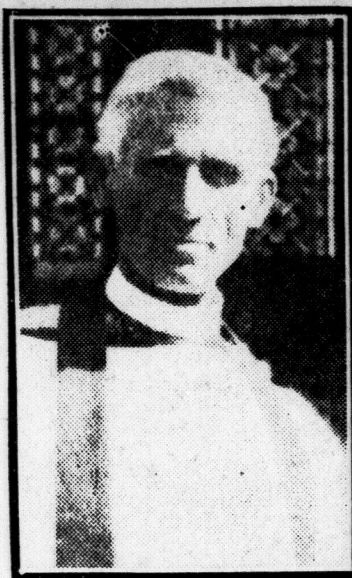

TAKES ACTION TO GET PROPERTY

Efforts To Recover Value of House Furnishings and Farm Implements Made.

An action to recover the value of house furnishings and farm implements, alleged to have been misappropriated by the defendants, which was instituted by Mrs. Elsie Bellows, administratrix of the estate of the late Henry Bellows, against Edward Antes, was heard before Judge Talbot Macbeth in the county court yesterday. All the evidence was heard, and the counsel were ordered to cite the law before Judge Macbeth today.

The plaintiff alleges that, until her marriage a few years ago, her husband, Henry Bellows, resided with his mother and stepfather, Mr. and Mrs. Antes. He was the owner of the house furnishings and farm implements, she claims. Upon his marriage he moved to another farm, but never relinquished his title to the furniture and implements. The defendants claim that Mrs. Antes is the real owner of the articles in question.

A collie dog, three pounds of lard, a wash-basin, a half-dozen cups and saucers and a number of hay are among the articles in dispute.

C. P. R. ANNOUNCES ANNUAL FLOWER AWARD

St. Marys Man Wins First Prize For Station Agent's Garden.

The Canadian Pacific Railway has announced their annual awards for the best flower gardens on the London division. First prize for the best station agent's garden was awarded to J. W. Stockdale, agent at St. Marys, and the second prize to A. B. Bruce, agent at Streetsville Junction.

For the best flower garden in connection with section foremen's dwellings, Section Foreman E. Skinner at Lakeside was awarded first prize, and the second prize went to Section Foreman A. Fairbanks at Caradoc.

The London division was fortunate in securing both prizes for the best gardens in connection with car foremen's premises on the Ontario district, the first prize going to A. Duckworth, car foreman at St. Thomas, and the second prize to C. T. Ridall, car foreman at London.

The first prize for the best flower garden in connection with round-house borders was awarded to Ontario district was also secured by the London division, and Locomotive Foreman E. J. Murphy at Port Burwell was awarded the first prize.

LOCAL LABOR PARTY PREPARES CAMPAIGN

DR. MALLOY, MANITOBA, APPOINTED TO SENATE

Dr. J. P. Malloy of Manitoba To Take Senator Bradbury's Seat.

Canadian Press Despatch. Ottawa, Oct. 6.—Dr. J. P. Malloy of Morris, Man., former liberal member in the house of commons for Provencher, Man., has been appointed to the senate to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the late Senator George Bradbury of Selkirk, Man. Official announcement to this effect was made tonight.

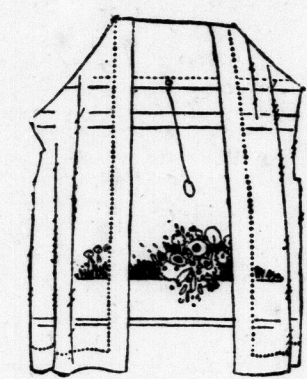
Dr. Malloy was born on March 13, 1873, at Arthur, Ont., and was educated at Emerson, Man., and Toronto, Ont. The new appointee to the senate was Liberal candidate in the provincial elections in Manitoba in 1907. He was first elected to the house of commons in 1908, and re-elected in 1911 and 1917, but was defeated in 1921.

The appointment of Dr. Malloy to the senate fills the remaining vacancy in the upper chamber. Ten other senatorial appointments were recently announced.
