

BRITISH RAILWAY STRIKE AT END, MEN RESUME WORK

Unexpected Agreement Reached When Company Officials Meet Union Heads.

AT ALL NIGHT SESSION

Associated Press Despatch. London, Jan. 28.—The railroad strike has been settled, and the men have decided to resume work immediately.

The agreement was reached at a joint conference between members of the Associated Society of Locomotive Engineers and Firemen and the railway officials, which began at 10 o'clock last night and lasted until 4:40 this (Tuesday) morning.

The details of the agreement under which the strike was settled and the men will return will be published today.

Early last night when there had appeared to be a hopeless deadlock in the railway strike situation there came an announcement that a joint conference had begun at 10 o'clock between the railway managers, the mediation committee of the Trades Union Congress, and J. Bromley, secretary of the Associated Society of Locomotive Engineers and Firemen and three members of the executive committee of the Associated Society.

MANITOBA MAKES HUGE PROFITS FROM LIQUOR

C. N. R. EMPLOYEES WANT \$2,000,000

Schedule Calls For Increases in Wages To 19,000 Men.

Toronto, Jan. 28.—Representatives of the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees of the central region of the C. N. R. opened a three-day conference in the Labor Temple today, at which amendments to the wage and conditions schedules, now before the railways, is the chief matter of business.

The schedule calls for a 12½ per cent increase in wages to 19,000 employees, ranging from third-class laborers to members of the clerical staff. The increase averages \$16 a month, and would add a sum of approximately \$2,000,000 to the payroll of the system if accepted without change.

Negotiations between the company and the men will be resumed Feb. 12 in Montreal.

The meeting today agreed to the appointment of a permanent board of adjustment, which, if accepted by the railways, would consist of six members, three representatives of the railways and three of the men, who would choose a seventh member, if they failed to adjust a difference.

CABINET PLANS DRASTIC STEPS TO ECONOMIZE

Premier King Declares Effort Will Be Made To Cut Estimates.

HOLD CONFERENCES

Ottawa, Jan. 28.—With the consideration of estimates, which occupies the Dominion cabinet almost daily now, there is much talk of retrenchment.

To what extent this will effect the carrying out of public works and the personnel of the civil service is not known, of course.

The prime minister has called a meeting for next Friday of heads of departments and the civil service commission with the cabinet. This will probably be only the first of a series of conferences at which the personnel and strength of departments will be discussed and matters of dispute between departmental heads and the civil service commission will be settled.

That there will be drastic economy in the preparation of this year's estimates was admitted today by the prime minister, Right Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, who said at the end of the cabinet council that every detail of public expenditure was being carefully scrutinized, and every effort was being made at cutting down the estimates, so far as is consistent.

Man With Fortune Dies In Poverty

Worth Half a Million Dollars, Lived in Hut.

New York, Jan. 28.—In a hut in which he had lived for forty years while he gathered a fortune estimated at half a million dollars, the body of Stephen Senior of Perth Amboy, N. J., was found yesterday. In freezing weather he had attempted to go without a fire. He was dressed in ragged clothing. His body was found near the door where he had crawled in a desperate attempt to get help.

FOUNDATION FOR RESEARCH BY BANTING ESTABLISHED

University Announces Fund Will Be Provided For Medical Work.

PLANS ARE ANNOUNCED

Will Be Available To All Who Undertake Definite Problems.

Toronto, Jan. 28.—The Banting research foundation is now an established fact. Following weeks of careful consideration in university and scientific circles, the plans for the organization of the foundation were announced today by G. A. L. Gibson, secretary-treasurer of the Alumni Federation of the University of Toronto.

Its purposes are stated to be as follows:

"To provide in the first instance sufficient financial support for the Banting and Best chair of medical research."

"To establish a fund for the adequate financial support of such scientific workers as have proposed definite problems of medical research, and for whom funds are not otherwise available. Such assistance may be given not only to persons working in the University of Toronto but also elsewhere."

All financial arrangements in connection with the collection and reception of the principal and subsequent expenditure of the income of the fund, which is expected to reach \$500,000 in six months, are to be vested in a board of trustees.

NEW TAX PROGRAM FINDS PROTEST

Radicals, Socialists and Communists Launch Strong Offensive Against Poincare.

DEMAND IS SUSTAINED

Paris, Jan. 28.—The Radicals, Socialists and Communists launched a strong offensive against the government's new tax program in the Chamber of Deputies this afternoon, when they filed 80 amendments, while the leaders of the groups were discussing from the speaker's platform four different motions: to adjourn the discussion until after the elections.

The finance committee voted to report adversely on the amendments, and the Chamber rejected one after the other the motions to adjourn the debate.

Premier Poincare's demand that all motions to postpone consideration of the measures be rejected was sustained by 428 to 152, a discussion of the measures, article by article, will be taken up at once.

The vote of 152 was the biggest vote the opposition has been able to muster, but this is not regarded as a test of strength of the government forces, as the division of the Chamber will be modified when it comes to the vote on the propositions themselves tomorrow. The tactics of the Socialists and Radicals in endeavoring to smother the bills with amendments, it is predicted tonight in parliamentary circles, are doomed to the same fate as the motions to adjourn. The government majority will be smaller, but it will be large enough, in the opinion of experts in parliamentary proceedings. The amendments will be quickly disposed of, as outside the Socialist and Radical groups the opponents of the new taxes believe in a straight fight for and against them.

SAYS MARITIMES ARE NOT BEGGARS

New Brunswick Premier Asks Co-operation From Rest of Canada.

TELLS OF SACRIFICES

St. John, N.B., Jan. 28.—"We are not beggars in the Maritime provinces. We are not threatening our sister provinces, nor does New Brunswick envy them the progress they have been able to achieve through sacrifices which we have been willing to undergo in order that confederation might hold together, but it does seem to me that our Upper Canadian friends should get in closer touch with us, that they should allow the spirit of the almighty dollar to be the sole object that prompts them in the development of the country. We cannot always endure, without some protest, the very apparent lack of interest on their part in the future growth and prosperity of the Maritimes. If our people had acted in that way in 1867 there would be no Canada today as we see it."

Thus declared Hon. P. J. Veniot, premier of New Brunswick, in an address which he delivered here today. "There is no doubt," the premier declared, "that but for the overshadowing influence of the provinces of the newer west and apparent selfish spirit that seems to guide the older provinces, the Maritimes would not be compelled today to fight for their very existence because of the refusal of our friends in other provinces to recognize that without the sacrifices made by us at a time when their future was far from bright they would not today be enjoying that era of expansion and prosperity which is being denied us down by the sea."

"Proper transportation arrangements through our two Atlantic winter ports and an adequate adjustment of our freight rates is the keynote of success in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia."

FIFTEEN KILLED IN GAS BLAST

Pawtucket, R. I., Apartment Is Scene of Terrible Explosion Yesterday.

Pawtucket, R. I., Jan. 28.—Fifteen persons were killed by a gas explosion in a two-family house at Cumberland Hill, Pawtucket, early today. Mrs. Michael Conway was awakened by her young daughter, who complained of the odor of gas. Mrs. Conway lit a lamp and the explosion which destroyed the house followed. Mrs. Conway, her two sons and daughter escaped, but the husband, Michael Conway, was killed. In the adjoining house a family named Hammill resided and it is believed they are all dead.

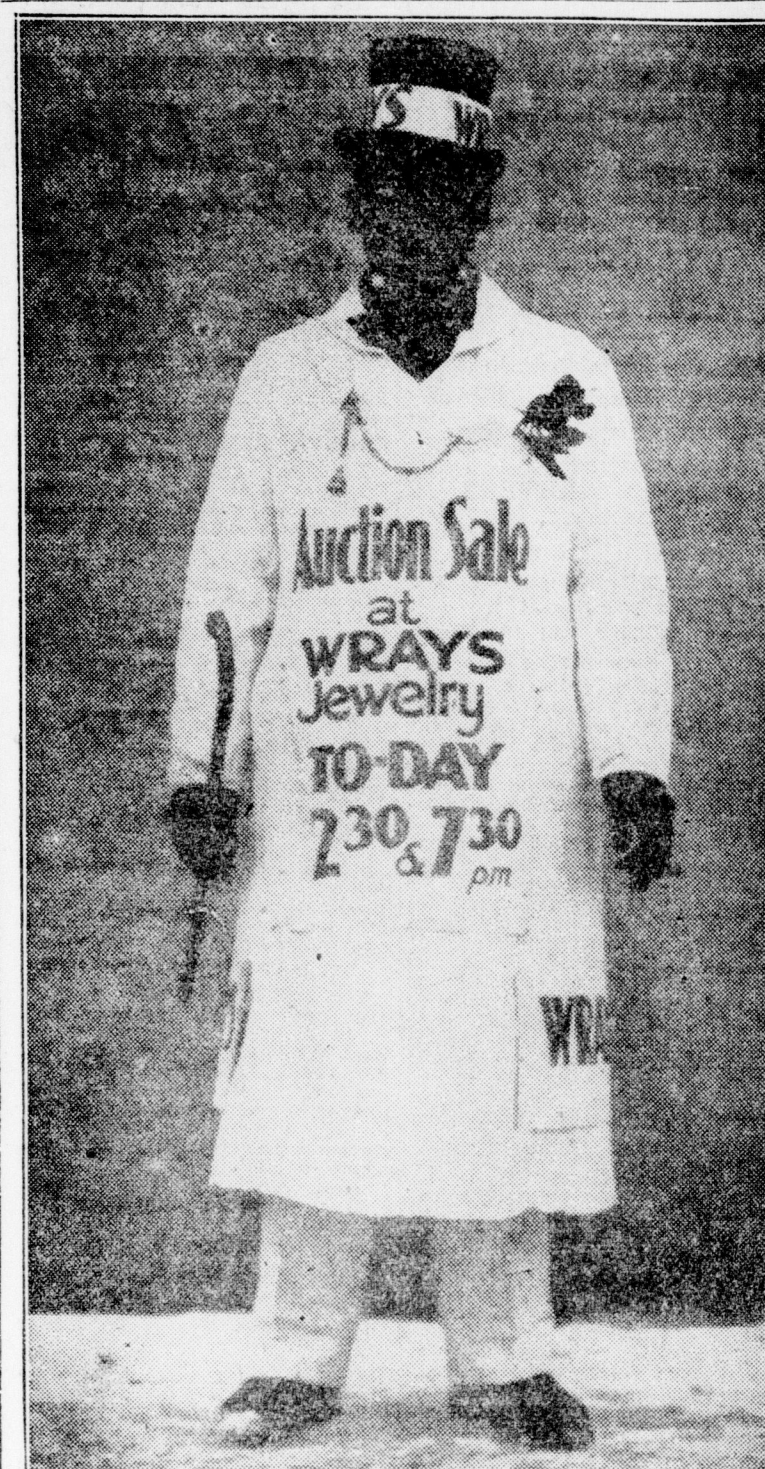

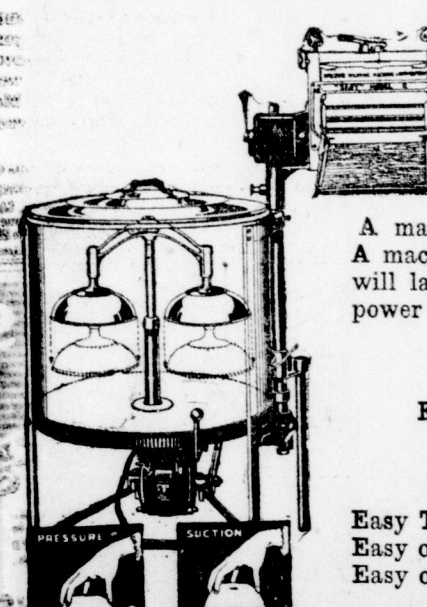
