Williams, who a few weeks ago gave notice of his intention to introago gave notice of his intention to intro-duce a by-law for the purpose of keeping the boys and girls of the city off the streets at night, has just received from the city clerk of Stillwater, Minn., a copy of the now famous ordinance of that city, enacted on February 9 of this year with a similar object in view. The copy was received in response to Ald. Williams' request for information and is published in full. It is thought that a by-law drafted on similar lines might be

found very advantageous in Victoria:

"Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any

the peace and quiet of the city.

"Section II —Aly noy or girl who violates any of the provisions of the first section shall be subject to arrest by any police officer or any citizen without process. Upon nunciation, the Bishop of Columbia took such arrest he or she shall be taken and desuch arrest ne or she shell be barents, guar-livered into the hands of the parents, guara second or any subsequent arrest such offender shall be taken by such officer or person before the municipal court for trial, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars or by imprisonment not exceeding ten days. Section III -It shall be the duty of the chief engineer of the fire department to have the hour of nine p.m. designated by ringing the city fire bell nine slow taps con-

secutively.
"Section IV.—This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication as required by law."
