### UNJUST TO CANADIAN SEALERS

#### THE "PROPOSED" REGULATIONS A RANK INJUSTICE.

Hon. Mr. Dickey Sworn in as Minister of Militia—Treaty Valley Canal Fender—Ontario's Timber Resources Overestimated—Dominion Rifle Association News.

Ottawa, April 1.—The enquiry into the open seas on cattle which Mr. Mulock provoked by his action in the House last session has led to a kindred investigation, with action bearing upon it, which could not have been anticipated by the cattle exporters who primed Mr. Mulock into introducing his bill. It appears that the amount of space allowed for cattle on Canadian vessels is two feet eight inches all over, while the United States regulations restrict the space to two feet six inches on the spar deck. The attention of Mr. Magee, the commissioner appointed to enquire into the difference between the Canadian and the United States regulations, as affecting space, information has been sought in all quarters and there is a universal opinion of opinion on the part of the experts that two feet six inches on the spar deck is ample, and in fact preferable in rough weather, as it affords greater protection for the animals. Under these circumstances no order in council has been passed reducing the amount of space for each animal on the spar deck to two feet six inches. On other decks the space will remain as at present, namely, two feet eight. This change will be of great advantage to the steamship people, representing to them the carrying of vessels which they control in the carrying trade a sum of \$26,000 on a season's work.

#### New Cattle Disease Starts Afloat.

The Department of Agriculture has been notified of the existence of a disease among cattle in Cape Breton. In view of the present circumstances, calling for greater vigilance in respect to the disease, Mr. J. A. Macdonald, veterinary inspector of Halifax Quarantine, visited the animals said to be affected. He found that one animal had died from impact of the third stomach, the animal having been fed on hay and water. This incident is mentioned in order to show from what causes reports of contagious diseases among cattle will sometimes arise.

#### Treat Valley Canals.

The tenders for the Pictou and Lakeside division of the Treat Canal have been extended to to-morrow and will be decided as to who the successful tenderer is. The contract for the canal is between Mr. Brown, Love & Aylmer of Jarvis-street, Toronto, and George Goodwin of Ottawa, as to who will be successful. These two tenders are within a few hundred dollars of each other. The approximate cost of the canal is \$350,000 for six miles of canal work. By the change of route which Mr. Schreiber suggested, and approved by the Government, a saving of \$100,000 will be effected, and double the amount of work will be put in the hands of the contractor. It is reported that the estimate for the present lease of Rideau Range for another three years after the expiration of the present lease is not to be adopted just yet, nothing will be done towards a new range for some time.

#### Ontario's Timber Resources Overestimated.

In Dominion Statistician Johnson's latest publication, "Forest Wealth of Canada," it is estimated that the Province of Ontario has 2,000,000,000 cubic feet of timber. This estimate is based on a survey made in 1888 by Mr. Burgess, Deputy Minister of the Interior, published for the first time in 1890. It is now reported that the estimate submitted to the Ontario Legislature in 1890 is in excess of what it should be by 24,000,000,000 cubic feet, and by \$60,000,000 in value.

### PROF. WRONG'S APPOINTMENT

#### MR. ROSS EXHIBITS THE CHANCELLOR OF THE UNIVERSITY.

#### Trade Opening With Mexico.

D. Consul Ansell takes great interest in the proposed fair and thinks it a grand opportunity for Canada to work up an excellent trade with the republic.

#### Montreal Woolen Co. vs. Dominion.

The Dominion case time ago took action in the Exchequer Court against the Montreal Woolen Company for about \$150,000 damages done to the Lachine canal through the erection of the mill. The company put in a counter claim for \$120,000 damages from the Government for damages caused by the canal to the mill. To-day Justice Burbridge threw out the counter claim, on the ground that he had no jurisdiction. The case of the Government against the company has not yet been disposed of. If the Woolen Company want to go on with their case against the Government they will have to do so by petition of right.

Another provision is that when an applicant for a charter is made the applicants must satisfy the Government of their fitness in every respect for the duties devolving upon such a company.

### WAS THE INSURANCE BITER BIT

#### A SOMEWHAT COMPLICATED CASE IN MONTREAL.

An Ex-Corvet Insured For \$10,000 By Misrepresentation in Favor of a Hotel-keeper—\$315 Premium Returned to the Insured, Who Levants and is Arrested For Theft.

Montreal, April 1.—A complicated and somewhat serious case was developed to-day by the prosecution of one Charles Dion, a bartender in the Broadway Hotel, opposite the Bonaventure Depot. He was charged in the Police Court with stealing from one Dame Paquette, wife of the proprietor of the Broadway House, the sum of \$815.

One Lafamme had been insured in January last for \$9000 in the Manufacturers' Life Insurance Company and for \$10,000 in the Equitable Life, but as the former company learned that the risk was not as represented they issued a notice of rescission, and on Saturday last returned the premium of \$315. The Equitable recovered theirs by consent the day previous, by repaying the premium to the insured, to Lafamme, who should have handed them over to Madame Paquette, but instead of this he was arrested on the charge of theft. He will come up for acquittal to-morrow. Lafamme has not been arrested.

#### Secured by Misrepresentation.

The policies were placed by L. C. Paquette, a son of the beneficiary and he expressed his indignation at the temperate man, keeper of a butcher shop and drover in St. Margaret-street. He was simply a man who had been deceived by Lafamme, who had been drinking ever since he was insured. In December, 1890, he was sentenced to four years in the Penitentiary for stealing a horse and wagon and his regular life in prison built up a reputation which was a source of disrepute, so that the doctors adjudged him a good risk in December last, a few days after the death of Lafamme, when the policies were applied for.

#### Another \$10,000 Refused.

Application was made in the first instance to the Equitable Life, but it was refused. In applying for this Lafamme filed a statement showing that he had been employed by Lafamme as an explanation as to why Paquette should be made the beneficiary of the policies.

### GOVERNMENT WILL INVESTIGATE.

An Officer Leaves for Owen Sound to Inquire into the Alleged Murder of a Provincial Detective.

Neither wound was sufficient to cause death, but it is claimed that the blows were inflicted by the murderer. The account of the case is given in the "Standard" of yesterday.
