T. JAMES' CEMETERY TO GET PERPETUAL CARE THROUGH ENDOWMENT FUND

For some years after St. James' Cemetery, Brooke, had been set apart as a Clergy Reserve for church purposes, it was allowed to go uncared-for, except for a few plot-owners who kept their plots in good condition. No provision was made for the unused provision was made for the unused parts of the cemetery, and this part along with many plots, for which no provision for care had been made, grew up with shrubbery and weeds, until the general appearance of the cemetery was unsightly.

About twelve or thirteen years ago, attempt was made under the lead.

an attempt was made under the leadership of the late Dr. R. G. Kelly and the Rector and wardens at that time, to improve the condition of the cemetery. Much was done but during the war the committee in charge found it difficult to retain a satisfactory carefaker but as gon as a pass. found it difficult to retain a satisfactory caretaker, but as soon as a permanent one could be procured the work was renewed. Much has been done by means of "bees." The improvements have been marked indeed. The whole cemetery has been levelled and it is practically all in a condition to be lawn-mowed. Many visitors at the Old Boys' Reunion last year expressed delight at the appearance of the Cemetery which now compares favourably with the best-kept rural or urban cemeteries. urban cemeteries.
Up to the present time the cost of

upkeep has been met by an annual fee from a few plot-owners, but the time has arrived when this work should be put on a permanent basis. should be put on a permanent basis. Prompted by the advice of many plot-owners, the committee decided this could best be done by raising an endowment, the interest from which will provide for all expenses of upkeep for all time to come. This will be an assurance that this cemetery at least, will never become a "commons", such as has been the fate of too many old Ontario Cemeteries.
