Ottawa, Dec. 7—There were 287 new post-offices opened during the fiscal year 1901, and 13,375,000 more letters were carried than in the previous year. The number of postal notes issued and paid during the year increased from 769,250 to 877,599, the aggregate value of the year's issue being \$1,459,015, an increase of \$108,349.

During the year 596 new postal notes offices were established, being an increase during the year from 3 160.


