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NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—The Tribune's London correspondent says in consultation with two Canadian officials who are now in London, the imperial authorities are devising a scheme for an extension of the auxiliary force to the Dominion. It is proposed to increase the militia, to make large grants for practice purposes and for other expenses of training, and to make generous contributions to a militia pension fund to be raised by the Canadian Government.

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
