The flowers were exhibited in the auditorium where they made a beautiful picture, with their brilliant coloring and artistic arrangement. There was also an interesting exhibit by the Dominion Entomological Dept., under the management of Mr. Sydney Payne, consisting of pictures of the various insects and the methods used to destroy them. During the afternoon addresses were given by Prof. S. Blair of the Experimental Farm at Kentville, and his brother, Dr. J. C. Blair, head horticulturist of the University of Illinois, Urbana. Afternoon tea was served in the Council Chamber under the tea committee, Mrs. R. S. Miller, Mrs. F. R. Hanington, Mrs. C. A. Ritchie, Mrs. V. R. Durling and the Misses Josephine Brittain, Dorothy Merriam, Janet Brittain and Gertrude Ritchie. Mrs. Carmon O'Dell and Miss Hilda King had charge of the tickets, and the flower committee under the regency of Miss Charlotte Perkins, were Mrs. E. W. Robinson, Mrs. F. F. Smith, Miss Maud Binning and Miss Irene Balcom. Messrs C. C. King, Lewis How, J. P. Spittal and Nelson and Sidney Patterson rendered valuable aid in arranging the exhibits, and the judges were Prof. S. Blair, Mr. Henry Fox, and Mr. Harry Withers. Fifty-eight prizes were awarded—nine of these going to C. S. Bothamley of The Pines, West Paradise. The evening show was declared even gayer and prettier than the afternoon, with the numerous lights, and the delightful music of the orchestra, which composed Mrs. P. M. Buzgale, Miss Margaret Wainwright, Miss Edna Anderson and Messrs L. Robertson, G. S. Piers, W. R. Smith and C. N. Whitman. The receipts amounted to over a hundred and ten dollars, and it is hoped that the general success of the show will encourage the I. O. D. E. to make it an annual event.

FOX BREEDERS ANNUAL MEETING

N. S. Branch Withdraws From Dominion Association—Election of Officers And Other Business Transacted.

A well attended annual meeting of the Nova Scotia branch of the Silver Black Fox Breeders Association of Canada was held in the Board of Trade rooms on Tuesday afternoon and evening of last week, Dr. Rendall of Truro, presiding, Secretary E. M. McDougall of West Gore, Hants Co., and a number of members from various parts of the Province beyond the County of Annapolis were present.

An address of welcome on behalf of the town was given by Mayor Hicks which was well received. The committee appointed some months ago to meet the government re tax remissions reported that in the case of fox owners who were not themselves ranching but were having foxes kept for them at ranches owned by other parties were not liable for the tax of \$2 previously imposed.

Nine new members were received. On resolution it was decided to withdraw from the Canadian Fox Breeders Association and form a distinct Nova Scotia Branch. Some matters of policy appeared to render this advisable while the Provincial branch will still co-operate in a general way with the larger body.

Dr. Rendall was appointed to draw up a new constitution. Election of officers resulted as follows:

CANDIDATES FOR LOCAL HOUSE

Conservative Convention Here Unanimously Chooses O. P. Goucher, And Harry T. McKenzie.

On Wednesday afternoon last O. P. Goucher of Middleton and Harry T. McKenzie of Bridgetown were unanimously chosen to contest Annapolis County in the interests of the Conservative party at the next Provincial election.

The gathering which was the annual meeting of the party was presided over by Mr. Harry McKenzie and after a small amount of routine business was transacted, A. L. Davidson, A. T. Moore and E. V. Dittmars were appointed a nominating committee to submit names of Provincial candidates to the meeting.

Election of officers for the year resulted as follows:

After election, W. L. Hall, K.C., Provincial party leader, R. T. Caldwell and Geo. C. Nowlan, Conservative candidates in Kings County, A. L. Davidson, ex-M. P. and Col. C. E. Bent were invited to seats on the platform along with the President and Geo. E. Corbitt, chairman of the nominating committee and the candidates chosen Mr. McKenzie and Mr. Goucher.

Addresses were delivered by the candidates by Geo. E. Corbitt, R. T. Caldwell, Geo. C. Nowlan and W. L. Hall.

The candidates briefly thanked the convention for the honors accorded and expressed the opinion that a business like administration was needed at Halifax. Taxation at the present time was also discussed and optimism expressed in connection with results at the next Provincial election.

Mr. Rendall and Geo. E. Nowlan, both attached the local government policy on Crown Lands, Hydro, and Taxation generally. W. L. Hall on arising paid a high tribute to the ability of the statesmen produced by the County of Annapolis, and accused the Local Government of giving Crown lands to big holders all of whom but two were Americans. Hydro was also discussed and the St. Margaret's Bay developments and Mr. Hall alleged that while power was now being produced much cheaper than ever before the public were getting no benefit in the matter of rates.

He announced economy and retrenchment as the party watchword. Independent of audits, business men at head of government departments.
