THE LATE SNOW STORM.

THE great snow storm of last week - or rather succession of snow storms - has been one of the heaviest for several years. It has extended over a vast section of the upper part of the Continent, and in some localities has drifted to great heights. All the railways in Canada, and throughout the Western States, have been more or less impeded, in some cases the trains being completely snowed up. The Michigan Central, the Detroit and Milwaukee, and the Grand Trunk, have been among the principal sufferers, although the trains on the Great Western, the Michigan Southern, and others further west, have been rendered very irregular. It is gratifying to know that, although trains have run into snow-drifts, and some of them have been thrown off the track, no loss of life in consequence of the storm has been reported. Those who have been travelling have been much delayed and annoyed, and in some instances have suffered a little cold and hunger; but otherwise there has been "no body hurt." The trains are gradually resuming their accustomed regularity.

UNITED STATES TARIFF ON CANADIAN PRODUCTS.

WE published last week the United States Tariff on the leading products of British North America, to be levied after the 17th March next. We now submit a complete list of all the articles hitherto free under the Reciprocity Treaty, and the duty which the present United States Tariff will impose after the repeal of the Treaty. It will be useful for reference: -

Table listing various products and their duties under the United States Tariff. Items include Animals (Free), Ashes (15 per cent), Bark (10), Barley (15c per bushel), Beans (1c per lb), Butter (4c per lb), Cheese (4c per lb), Coal (60c per ton), Firewood (20 per cent), Fish (various rates), Flour (20 per cent), Furs (various rates), Grindstones (Free), Gypsum (Free), Hides (10 per cent), Lard (2c per lb), Meats (35 per cent), Oats (10c per bushel), Peas (19), Pelts (10), Pitch (20), Plants (20), Poultry (85), Rags (10), Seeds (1c), Tar (20 per cent), Tobacco (25c per lb), Wheat (20c per bushel).
