The president's prize banner, won last year by the Quebec provincial union, will be returned to convention and similarly awarded to the provincial auxiliary which shows the largest percentage of increase in paid-up memlargest percentage of increase in paid-up membership during the past year, as certified by the books of the Dominion treasurer. Provincial treasurers will please notice that no province will be eligible to compete for this banner unless the full amount of its provincial duca is received by the Dominion treasurer before May 18th.

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
