Marcel Lambert (Edmonton West): Mr. Speaker, in order to see whether the government's courage is on the same level as that expressed by the Minister of Citizenship and Immigration, would the President of the Privy Council as house leader tell us whether we can have the estimates of the Department of External Affairs on Thursday, in order to dispel the web of obfuscation so ably woven by the Secretary of State for External Affairs with regard to Canada's position concerning a number of aspects of international relations?

Mr. McIlraith: Mr. Speaker, I shall note what the hon. member has stated. A decision as to the business of the house will be made by the usual methods, which may involve consultation with the various party house leaders. I hope to make an announcement at ten o'clock.
