AGRICULTURE

REQUEST FOR PROGRESS REPORT ON RE-ESTABLISHMENT OF SUGAR BEET INDUSTRY

Mr. J. R. Holmes (Lambton-Kent): Mr. Speaker, my question is for the Minister of Agriculture and is prompted by the recent report of the Food Prices Review Board from which I should like to quote one short statement: "The sugar situation is anything but encouraging." That is in the September report, Mr. Speaker. May I ask the minister, first, if he is in a position to present to this House his national sugar policy and second, what progress has he made on fulfilling his commitment to re-establish the sugar beet industry in southwestern Ontario?

Hon. E. F. Whelan (Minister of Agriculture): Mr. Speaker, if the sugar beet industry had been re-established a year ago or even two years ago, I am sure the hon. member would agree that it would probably have paid for itself several times in view of the over 300 per cent increase in sugar price to which the consumers of Canada have been subjected to. We only supply 10 per cent or 11 per cent of our normal consumption of sugar from our own production. We are continually working on advancing a sugar policy and I am sure the hon. member realizes that this has international complications which have to be worked out. However, we are still working on it and as soon as possible I will be submitting a paper to my colleagues.

NATIONAL DEFENCE

BASE FOR OVERHAUL AND REPAIR OF BOEING 707's AT WINNIPEG—DATE OF OPENING—SOURCE OF FUNDS FOR ESTABLISHMENT

Mr. Dan McKenzie (Winnipeg South Centre): Mr. Speaker, my question is for the Minister of National Defence. Can the minister inform the House when the first of the military Boeing 707's is to receive the 10,000 hour overhaul at the Winnipeg air base?

Hon. James Richardson (Minister of National Defence): Mr. Speaker, the commitment to have the 707's repaired in Winnipeg is being implemented and the per-

sonnel are being trained. I cannot give the date, but it will be early in 1975.

Mr. McKenzie: A supplementary, Mr. Speaker. Are funds from the DND budget to be used to establish and tool a Boeing overhaul base for CAE, and is there difficulty at the present time in securing the necessary funds?

Mr. Richardson: Mr. Speaker, funds will be provided by the federal government, probably through the Department of Industry, Trade and Commerce. There may also be some assistance from National Defence because this is an undertaking of the government to help build a Boeing overhaul facility in Winnipeg.
