

2. No, because 75 per cent of the turnover in 1977, 72 per cent in 1978 and 95 per cent in 1979, of the figures presented in part one, is represented by clerical positions where mobility is much higher than the administrative and sales positions. This is further compounded by the fact that the corporation is a small organization with very few promotion opportunities, consequently, employees often have to look outside for more senior positions. The above should be compared with a turnover of 19.3 per cent (1979) in the administrative support category of the public service where promotion opportunities are far greater.
