CANCELLATION OF CONTACT PROGRAM

Mr. Darryl L. Gray (Bonaventure—Îles-de-la-Madeleine): Mr. Speaker, not long ago, The French network of the CBC, Radio-Canada, announced that the program "Contact" would be dropped. This program had a daily listener rating of 40,000. "Contact" was the only program covering social and cultural activities in the Gaspé.

The half-million dollars Radio-Canada wanted to save in Gaspé could have been found in other areas, by cutting back on administration and overtime, for instance.

The decision by Radio-Canada to drop "Contact" reflects a petty attitude and a desire to politicize a decision that should have been a purely administrative one.

The people of the Gaspé will not tolerate being used by Radio-Canada in its attempts to blackmail the Government.

Remote regions really need Radio-Canada's regional services. If the Crown Corporation no longer wishes to accept that mandate, its very existence may be challenged.

Our Government's goal is to cut fat, not to cut services to remote communities.

REQUEST THAT QUEBEC GASOLINE SURTAX BE REDUCED

Mr. Vincent Della Noce (Duvernay): Mr. Speaker, this morning, gasoline was selling at 44.1 cents a litre in Ottawa and at 50 cents a litre in Montreal. That is a difference of 6 cents a litre and it does not go to the oil companies. It does not go to the retailers either, nor to the federal Government. The fact is that the Quebec surtax has not been adjusted to the lower prices since September 1984. Apparently, the elevator cannot go down when the prices fall.

Mr. Speaker, why wait for the next provincial budget to adjust this odious and unfair surtax charged to Quebecers?

When prices have increased in the past, the adjustment was made the very same week.

I have been denouncing this surtax since November 18, 1981, and I shall continue to denounce it until it is completely withdrawn because it was supposed to be temporary and variable. Withdrawal of this surtax would not make things better in Quebec than in Ontario, but it would put both provinces on the same footing.

This is my fondest wish for all Quebec consumers. This surtax is unfair and it has cost Quebec consumers about \$64 million. This money should be given back to them immediately.
