

in the cancellation of the Rhodes Banquet, supposedly from lack of funds, really for a very different reason. It seems to me tragic that the ideal of Rhodes should be in a large measure a flat failure, leading to the embitterment of half the American & a considerable proportion of the colonies, purely because of gross misunderstanding of the American & Colonial point of view.

I had the pleasure of a long talk with Canon (now Archdeacon) Scott of Quebec last week in which I gave him my opinion. He has two sons who are ex Rhodes scholars and I feel he can present my outlook if you ever see him in Montreal. He is not inclined to agree with me.

I feel very definitely that some action should be taken. It is not inspiring to see the Rhodes authorities nailing the white flag to the mast before a handful of American radicals for whose attitude they themselves & or Oxford itself is largely to blame. I know very personally the central figure in the last phase of this middle or a Rhodes man by the name of Pipkin & while I depurate his attitude I can certainly see his point of view.

I should certainly take it as a great favor if I could see you whenever I am in Montreal & which may not be this year or if I could lay my point of view before anyone you may suggest in Boston. I merely want you to realize that I am not talking to bear myself and that a really serious situation has developed.
