This Table shews the time of high water ashore, of which circumstance all masters of vessels ought to be well aware when they remove their vessels from one place to another; but the ebbing continues three quarters of an hour in the Channel.

RULE. Having found the age of the moon at the top of each month in the Calendar, look in the left column of the table for the day from new to the full moon, then in the right column the day from the full to the new moon, and in the middle column you will find the time when it is high water ashore.

EXAMPLE. The New Moon being the 20th December 1790, its age will therefore be 12 days on the 1st of January 1791, and you will find in the middle column 4h. 21m. opposite the moon's age 12 in the left column, which is the time at which it will be high water on that day, as also on the 16th. when the moon's age will be 27 days as appears opposite in the right column.

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
