## DECISION NOT REVERSED

George E. McConkey May Go Ahead With Hotel on Bay Street.

In spite of the objection raised by the National Club, The Mail and Empire, The Molsons Bank, and various stock brokers, the board of license commissioners yesterday reaffirmed its permission to George E. McConkey to build an hotel on Bay street. The meeting arose out of a petition circulated by Bay street property and lease holders, in which the board was asked to reverse its previous decision.

George Wilkie, representing the petitioners, claimed that Bay street was destined to become the Wall street of Toronto and that the presence of hotels on the street was undesirable.

NEW APPARATUS  
FOR DIVERS' USE  
Device Perfected by German Inventor Supplies Oxygen From Bottles.

A new device for the use of divers has been perfected by a German inventor. In the device, a diver, by means of a pump, draws air from a bottle of compressed air, which is carried on his back. The air is then drawn into a chamber containing a chemical which absorbs the carbonic acid gas in the expired air. A small amount of oxygen, just enough to renew the air, is added to the changed and regenerated exhalations and passed on to a compartment in the helmet, where it can be inhaled through the nose or mouth. By this system the vitiated air is continually being renewed.

It is thought this device will do away with the accidents and sometimes loss of life which have occasionally happened through defects in the diving hose or pump apparatus so long in use. But while the diver may carry his atmosphere, as one does his wardrobe, along with him, he cannot yet carry his atmosphere from the outer world, as the signal line is still necessary for means of communication.
