LONDON STOCK EXCHANGE.

LONDON, Oct. 1.—An increased de-

mand for treasury bills was mainly re-

sponsible for the shortening of money

supplies today. The market rates were

steady. New York cables announcing big

amounts of business ready at 4 1/2% to

4.75%.

The stock market maintained a good

tone. The feature was the demand for

the war loan at hardening prices. Foreign

stocks were in demand, and the market

for French and Japanese bonds was in

good request. Copper stocks were strong

in sympathy with the metal, and Anaconda

sold at 15 1/2%.

American securities were rather in-

creasing. The continued rise of exchange

caused a drooping tendency, but only a

few securities were transacted. The

closing was quiet.
