BIG DAY'S WORK DONE BY BRITISH AVIATORS. London, Sept. 29.—A British aerial communication says: "Our machines were active on every part of the front Friday and kept close watch from the air on the course of the various operations. Bomber patrols carried out at a low altitude along the battlefield attacks on enemy troops and transport at the canal crossings and along the roads during the war, and to the enemy with machine gun fire.

"Our machines working in co-operation with the artillery reported a great number of targets and observed the fall of the rounds. Many explosions and fires were observed in hostile battery positions. Over one thousand photographs were taken during the day.

"In addition to extensive bombing just beyond the lines, several enemy airships and a number of railway junctions were attacked with excellent effect. Thirty tons of bombs were dropped by us in the day and 15 1-2 tons at night.

"Twenty-two German machines and eight balloons were shot down by our airmen. Twenty machines were driven down out of control in the course of the air fighting. Another machine was destroyed by anti-aircraft fire.

"Nineteen of our machines are missing."

MEN SENT TO BOLSTER UP BULGARIAN FRONT. London, Sept. 29.—The German and Austrian press has been notified that troops are being sent to strengthen the Bulgarian front, according to special despatches to the London newspapers from Holland, which say this may be part of the internal propaganda which reported Premier Malinoff of Bulgaria as playing a lone hand in his bid to the entente for an armistice and eventual peace.

The Telegraph's Rotterdam correspondent mentions a report from Berlin of an imminent Bulgarian coup d'etat in response to anti-war agitation among the bulk of the people. The same correspondent hears that King Ferdinand himself played an active role in Bulgaria's peace move until Germany countered him.

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ENGINEER REPORTS ON COUNTY ROADS

Guelph, Sept. 28.—Assistant Engineer Huber of the Ontario department of public highways, has made his report of a tour of examination over the main road from Hamilton to Owen Sound, via Guelph, the various sections of which in the counties of Wentworth, Wellington and Grey, have been recently designated as provincial county roads. He reports favorably on the work that is going on in Wentworth County, paying particular attention to the big hill outside Hamilton, on the way to Guelph, known as "How Back" but is not at all flattering in regard to the roads in Wellington and Grey counties, deploring that one of the principal reasons for the present poor condition of the roads appears to be the absence of a policy of continuous work. In order that the road may be uniformly improved it is imperative that counties create an organization whereby the roads may be maintained from end to end.

OPEN AIR SERVICES ARE DISCONTINUED

Church Parades at Niagara Now Held in Y. M. C. A. Auditorium Tent.

Niagara Camp, Sept. 29.—The open air religious services in camp have been discontinued for the remainder of the season, and the Y.M.C.A. auditorium is now being used for the Sunday morning services, both by the Y.M.C.A. and the other denominations. Beginning this morning the Catholics paraded for services in the Y.M.C.A. tent at 8.30 under Captain Kelly, and the other denominations at 9.30, when Captain R. J. Kelly had charge of the service and Captain F. W. F. G. Andrews preached the sermon.

Two platoons, or half "A" Company of the Siberian field force, arrived in camp Saturday night from Kingston. One officer and 104 other ranks comprised the two platoons. The other half of "A" Company will come from London.

Pte. Norman E. McLeod, who died in the military hospital here from pneumonia, and whose next of kin resides in Jamaica, was buried in St. Mark's Cemetery, Niagara-on-the-Lake, yesterday with military honors.

The death toll in the Polish army here from Spanish influenza now totals 12, one having been added this morning. There are 135 cases in the hospital. Lieut.-Col. Lehman, commanding the Polish camp, says the epidemic situation is improving, and more patients are being discharged from the hospital than are admitted thereto.

Officer Cashiered.

London, Sept. 29.—The Gazette announces that Capt. F. E. Thomas of the army service corps has been cashiered by sentence of court-martial for applying goods to his own use. Thomas asserted in his defence that he could bring evidence involving many officers of senior rank. He admitted that he had been foolish, but said he had never done anything crooked. The prosecutor replied that headquarters was in possession of everything mentioned by Thomas.

Later it was announced that Sir Edward Kemp had ordered an enquiry into the charges.

Emperor Charles Presides Over Meeting on Bulgaria

Amsterdam, Sept. 29.—Emperor Charles presided at a meeting of the crown council at Vienna yesterday, according to a despatch to The Berlin Tageblatt. The meeting lasted until the night, and the chief subject was the foreign situation, particularly Bulgaria.
